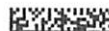

AND IT BEGINS! THE 115TH CONGRESS

The new year is here and the 115th Congress has been sworn in (as of this morning), but Washington, D.C., is still speculating on who will be President-elect Trump's secretary of agriculture. A candidate first mentioned months ago – former Georgia Governor Sonny Purdue – appears to be back at the top of Trump's list according to the latest media reports. The secretary of agriculture is one of only two cabinet positions (the other being the secretary of Veterans Affairs) yet to be appointed by the president-elect. Some appointments of interest to conservation districts have been made, however. They include the appointments of U.S. Rep. Ryan Zinke, R-Mont., to lead the Interior Department and Scott Pruitt, the current attorney general of Oklahoma, to head the EPA.

In Congress, Paul Ryan was once again voted speaker of the House and we expect House committee assignments to be made soon. NACD will be watching that process closely to make sure any new members on relevant House committees are aware of the critical work conservation districts do nationwide. Senate committee assignments were mostly made in December, although each party must ratify those assignments. For both the Senate and House Agriculture Committees, the chairmen and ranking

The same can be said of the House Natural Resources Committee and the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, which will once again be chaired by Rep. Rob Bishop of Utah and Sen. Lisa Murkowski of Alaska, respectively. Altogether, 55 new House lawmakers and seven new senators were sworn in today. NACD is eager to start developing relationships with these new members of Congress.

NACD, NRCS INTRODUCE RSET RECOGNITION PROGRAM

NACD and NRCS are partnering to salute early adopters of the agency's new Resource Stewardship Evaluation Tool (RSET). RSET Trailblazers are farmers and ranchers who have opted to use a free, comprehensive, and voluntary way of tracking and meeting their conservation goals. Through the RSET Trailblazers program, forward thinking producers who have developed and implemented RSET-derived conservation plans receive official letters of recognition signed by their local district board chair and NRCS district conservationist.

In 2017, NRCS will make RSET available to landowners and managers nationwide. To encourage folks to use the tool, NACD is asking its state contacts to forward information on the RSET Trailblazers program – [including templates for the Trailblazers' recognition letter and news release](#) – to their local districts. conservation practices like cover crops, crop rotation, and no-till.

“We were the first people in Hinds County to ever try no-till,” Barton told Mississippi NRCS’ Candace Chambers. “We had some very troublesome times initially (in the 1980s). It wasn’t very easy to do. Everybody ridiculed us and thought we were fools, but I couldn’t stand to see my land erode. We persevered and we’ve always been innovators.”



Barton currently farms about 2,000 acres of primarily wheat and soybeans, and occasionally grain sorghum, cotton, and corn. He has worked through NRCS’ Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) to plant cover crops and install overfall pipes, flashboard risers, riparian buffers, and levees. He also utilizes irrigation water management and integrated pest management tools.

“Mr. Barton has taken advantage of the EQIP program and has had three contracts. He’s an innovator,” said Don Lackey, Mississippi NRCS soil conservation technician. “He’s not afraid to try new things and that’s the reason why he’s been so successful with his farm.”

“NRCS has helped me and encouraged me since I got involved with them in 1973,” said Barton. “I’m about to be 77 years old and I still believe in the work we’re doing.”

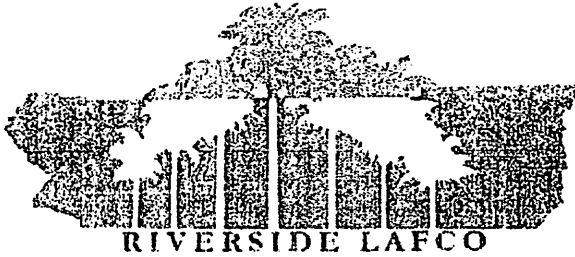
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

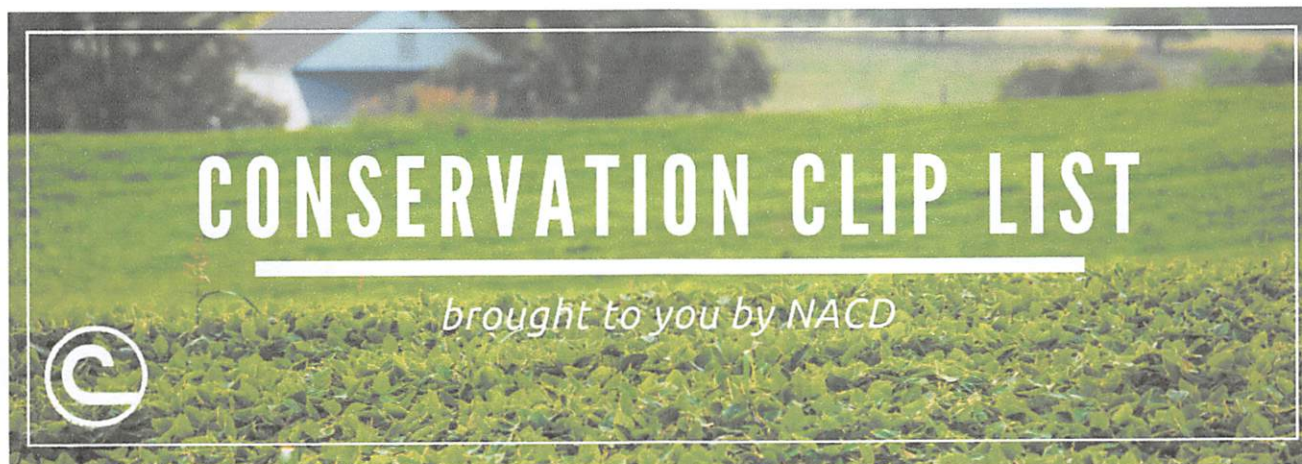

Three areas ripe for private sector investment in land, water, and wildlife via Agri-Pulse

(Opinion) By this time next year, I believe we'll reflect back on 2017 as the year that the private sector stepped up to protect our land, water, and wildlife for future generations. Forward-thinking businesses are rolling up their sleeves and finding ways to make those regulations work better by accelerating the uptake of practices that are good for the planet and the bottom line. Three areas to watch in 2017: Implementing bold agricultural commitments, investing in winning wildlife solutions, and ensuring a reliable water supply.

US considers mining limits in West to save sage grouse via The Washington Post

The Obama administration offered five possible plans for limiting mining on federal land in the West to protect the vulnerable greater sage grouse, but it isn't saying which it prefers. The options range from banning new mining activity on about 15,000 square miles for up to 20 years to imposing no additional restrictions on mine locations. The rules would affect sage grouse habitat on federal land in Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, and Wyoming.

Researchers track cows to determine riparian area impact via Capital Press

A five-year study of cattle grazing on federal rangeland showed they spend only 1 percent to 2.5 percent of their time in streams or in riparian buffer areas, a finding that may prove important as debate continues over the impact of cattle on public land. The findings are potentially significant because critics of public land grazing practices have long contended cattle trample and erode streambanks and pollute water.

USDA announces new conservation farmland transfer policy via Associated Press

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced a new policy designed to allow farmers to take land out of a conservation program early if it is to be transferred to the next generation of farmers. Normally, early termination of a CRP contract requires repayment of all previous payments plus interest. The new policy waives this repayment if the land is transferred to a beginning farmer or rancher.

New Yellowstone dam challenged over sturgeon worries via The Washington Post

Wildlife advocates plan to challenge the approval of a new Yellowstone River dam aimed at benefiting Montana and North Dakota farmers that critics say could kill off a dwindling population of a fish species dating to the time of dinosaurs. The dam would supply water to about 400 farms that produce sugar beets, wheat, barley, alfalfa, and other crops. Bypasses to circumvent dams have been used with mixed success for salmon and other fish populations in the Pacific Northwest and New England, but never for pallid sturgeon.

Is complete ban on lead shot necessary to protect eagles? via The Des Moines Register

(Opinion) According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, there were fewer than 500 nesting pairs of bald eagles in the United States in 1963. By 2006 — after bans on the pesticide DDT and on lead shot for waterfowl hunting — that number had increased to nearly 10,000. Thus it's not surprising that we should find more sick or dead eagles. But if the lead shot hunters commonly use to shoot birds such as pheasants, quail, and doves is killing eagles, should further restrictions be imposed? And how might those restrictions affect all birds, both those we hunt and those we wish to protect?

Republicans Aim to Gut Endangered Species Act via High Country News

Utah Congressman Rob Bishop is one of the House Republicans who has backed a bill to increase water storage in California and weaken protections for the smelt — prioritizing “people over ideology,” Bishop wrote last year. As chair of the House Resources Committee, Bishop has become a leader of a radical, anti-environmental movement in Congress. Their agenda includes transferring public lands from federal management to states and local governments, banning the creation of national monuments, and removing protections for existing monuments.

Trump Sows Dismay in Rural America With Late Agriculture Choice via Bloomberg

In the two months since the election, the president-elect selected 13 of 15 cabinet posts, from the departments of State to Justice to Health and Human Services. But he's left to the end his candidate to lead the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the agency most connected to rural voters who helped propel him into office. While the president-elect has said little about how he'd change farm policy, aside from easing up on environmental regulation, some of his statements about trade and immigration could have major implications for agricultural businesses.

Obama administration aids giant California water project via The Washington Post

The outgoing Obama administration tried to nudge forward Gov. Jerry Brown's proposal to build two giant north-south water tunnels for California. Brown wants a handful of California water districts to build the twin, 35-mile-long water tunnels to pipe Northern California's water to central and Southern California.

Spread by trade and climate, bugs butcher America's forests via Fox News

In a towering forest of centuries-old eastern hemlocks, it's easy to miss one of the tree's nemeses. No larger than a speck of pepper, the Hemlock woolly adelgid spends its life on the underside of needles sucking sap, eventually killing the tree. The bug is one in an expanding army of insects draining the life out of forests from New England to the West Coast. Aided by global trade, a warming climate, and drought-weakened trees, the invaders have become one of the greatest threats to biodiversity in the United States.

HAMILTON COUNTY SWCD IN INDIANA

Hamilton County is not just the fastest growing county in Indiana – it neighbors Indianapolis and is home to several of the state's largest cities. The Hamilton Soil and Water Conservation District has served the county and its urban land owners through its Backyard Conservation Program for years. Now, as a 2016 awardee of NACD's Urban Agriculture Conservation Grants Initiative, the district is providing on-site technical assistance to residents as they develop and maintain urban food plots.



Hamilton SWCD offers technical assistance to residents in many forms, including instruction on how to use soil health practices like no-till and cover crops, and how to manage nutrients, water, and pests effectively. The district is also developing partnerships within the county to encourage established or developing community gardens – as well as individual gardeners – to donate portions of their yields to local food banks through the “Hamilton County Garden Network.”

ARTICLE 1. ACCEPTANCE OF TERMS AND CONDITIONS: The initiation of performance of the scope of work by the Consultant shall constitute unqualified acceptance of all terms and conditions herein. Any additional or different terms and conditions proposed by the Consultant are rejected unless expressly agreed to in writing by an authorized representative of the District's Purchasing Department. This is an integrated agreement and may not be modified except in writing signed by both parties or as otherwise expressly provided herein. Consultant is an independent contractor and no employee or agent of Consultant shall become an employee of District by reason of this contract.

ARTICLE 2. PURCHASE ORDER REQUIRED: The District will not be responsible for services rendered without a purchase order properly signed by the District's Purchasing Agent or authorized agent. When the purchase order covers a continuing service rendered over a stated period of time, Consultant must obtain a new purchase order or request amendment to the original purchase order upon expiration of the time period to authorize the continuance of the service for an additional period of time.

ARTICLE 3. STANDARD OF CARE: The Consultant shall perform the services in accordance with generally accepted professional practices and principles and in a manner consistent with the level of care and skill ordinarily exercised by members of the profession practicing under similar conditions. Consultant shall also comply with State and Federal Environmental and Safety Regulations as they apply to the scope of work.

ARTICLE 3. WARRANTY: The Consultant warrants that all services and documents provided as part of the services shall conform to the District's specifications, the requirements of this contract and approved sample(s), if any, and are free from defects in design and workmanship. All services and/or documents provided as part of the services are subject to final inspection and approval within a reasonable time after completion. The District shall pay Consultant the reasonable value of services rendered for any portion of the work completed prior to termination. If said termination occurs prior to completion of any task for the project for which a payment request has not been received, the charge for services performed during such task shall be the reasonable value of such services, based on an amount mutually agreed to by the District and Consultant of the portion of such task completed but not paid prior to said termination. The District shall not be liable for any costs other than the charges or portions thereof which are specified herein. ARTICLE 5. CHANGES: The District may direct in writing changes, including additions to or deletions from specifications or drawings. If any such change causes a material increase or decrease in the cost of, or the time required for, performance hereunder, an equitable adjustment shall be made in the price or schedule. Any claims for adjustment which Consultant believes result from any change directed by District shall be asserted in writing by Consultant no later than ten (10) days from the date of Consultant's receipt of any such direction. Equitable adjustments for any claims or changes under this agreement, including claims arising from terminations or

suspensions directed under Article 4, will be made by written request for a Purchase Order Amendment request. It shall be mandatory upon the Consultants and any subconsultants to comply with all California Labor Code provisions, which include but are not limited to prevailing wages, employment of apprentices, hours of labor, and debarment of contractors. If the services are being performed as part of an applicable "public works" or "maintenance" project, in addition to the foregoing, then pursuant to Labor Code sections 1725.5 and 1771.1, the Consultant and all subconsultants must be registered with the Department of Industrial Relations ("DIR"). Consultant shall maintain registration for the duration of the contract and require the same of any subconsultants. The Consultant's services may also be subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the DIR. It shall be the Consultant's sole responsibility to comply with all applicable registration and labor compliance requirements, including the submission of payroll records directly to the DIR.

ARTICLE 8. DELAYS: Consultant will not be liable for delays in performing its obligations to the extent the delay is caused by an unforeseeable condition which is beyond Consultant's reasonable control and without Consultant's fault or negligence. Acts of God, such as storms or floods, as well as government priorities, acts of civil or military authorities, fires, strikes, epidemics, war or riot are examples of events which will be excusable for being beyond Consultant's reasonable control, only upon fulfillment of the following conditions: (a) within seven (7) days of the commencement of any excusable delay, Consultant shall provide District with written notice of the cause and extent thereof as well as a request for a schedule extension for the estimated duration thereof, and (b) within seven (7) days of the cessation of the event causing delay Consultant shall provide District with written notice of the actual

delay incurred, upon receipt of which, the date of completion shall be extended for the time actually lost by reason of an excusable delay.

ARTICLE 9. ASSUMPTION OF RISK; INDEMNITY: Consultant assumes all risk in connection with performance or non-performance of this purchase order. CropSWAP Program

Scope of Work

1. **Program Description.** The CropSWAP Program implemented by RCWD provides financial assistance to RCWD's Agricultural and Agricultural/Residential customers for completion of crop conversion projects that save water through the replacement of existing crops with those that require less irrigation water. The CropSWAP Program aids sustaining local agriculture through current economic and water supply conditions while conserving water supplies for the benefit of all RCWD's customers.

2. **Scope of Work.** TEAM RCD agrees to provide RCWD the following services in accordance with the Crop SWAP Program:

a. Designate a TEAM RCD coordinator to schedule pre-conversion inspections and post-conversion inspections of the properties of Participating Growers who desire to complete a crop conversion project pursuant to the CropSWAP Program.

b. Conduct pre-conversion site inspections for proposed crop conversion projects prior to the start of construction to establish base line data, to ascertain actual acreage to be converted, to determine water savings that will result from the conversion, to determine potential financial incentive amounts, and to assess existing irrigation system efficiency.

c. Following the completion of the crop conversion work by Participating Growers, conduct post-conversion site inspections to verify the conversion work was performed according to the requirements of the Participation Agreement entered into between RCWD and the respective Participating Growers, including but not limited to, ascertaining the actual acreage removed/converted and assessing the efficiency of the improved irrigation system.

d. Provide written report of the results of each pre-conversion inspection and post-conversion inspection to RCWD within 14 working days following the completion of such inspection.

3. **Subcontractor.** TEAM RCD contracts with Mission Resource Conservation District, a California resource conservation district, for permitted and licensed staff to perform the services described herein.

NACD NORTH CENTRAL REGION ELECTS NEW LEADERSHIP IN ST. LOUIS

The North Central Region Board of Directors and its conservation partners met last week in St. Louis, Missouri, for their winter board meeting. Attendees reviewed the resolutions the region's states (Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, and Wisconsin) will submit for discussion at NACD's Annual Meeting next week. They also reviewed legislative priorities and elected new leadership – Ian Cunningham (MN), Executive Board Member; Emily Javens (MN), Region Chair; and Matt Peart (OH), Region Vice Chair.

This year, the meeting's guest speaker was Iowa State University professor [Dr. Lois Wright Morton](#). Dr. Morton's presentation, based on her social science research with farmers, detailed how increasing weather variability and other challenges affect farming operations and soil and water resources. After the meeting, some of the attendees – and several NACD Soil Health Champions – stayed for the National No-Tillage Conference.

MOVEMENT ON EPA'S WOTUS RULE

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Reminder: NACD offices closed on Friday

In observance of the inauguration of President-elect Trump, NACD's offices will be closed.

NACD meets with North Carolina leaders

NACD President Lee McDaniel poses with North Carolina Sen. Thom Tillis and NACD Board Member Frank Williams while attending the North Carolina Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts' annual meeting last week. Sen. Tillis joined the U.S. Senate in January 2015, where he sat on the Agriculture Committee for two years.



Last Friday, the Supreme Court agreed to review the 6th Circuit Court of Appeals decision to assert jurisdiction over EPA's Waters of the United States (WOTUS) rule. The case concerns whether, under the Clean Water Act, jurisdiction to hear a challenge to the lawfulness of the WOTUS rule lies in the courts of appeal or federal district courts.

Some say the Supreme Court's decision to review the jurisdictional issue is a victory for agriculture because district courts are generally thought of as "closer to the people" than appellate courts. It's not clear, however, whether the court's review (which is expected to happen before it adjourns in June), will be necessary. President-elect Donald Trump said during his 2016 campaign that he would "eliminate the unconstitutional" rule.

SENATE ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURCES HOLD HEARING ON SEC INTERIOR NOMINEE ZINKE

At time of the eResource going out, the hearing on President-elect Trump's pick to head the Interior Department – Montana Rep. Ryan Zinke – was still going on. Some quick highlights from earlier in the hearing are:

In a response to a question on local land management, Zinke said "the view from the Potomac is a lot different than the view from the Missouri."

Later in the hearing, Zinke said he voted upwards of 17 times against legislation that would allow federal public lands to be transferred to state ownership. He also said in response to a question posed by Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders that the "climate is changing and man has had an influence, the debate can be made over how much man has influenced."

Water, Trees, and Biscuits in 2017-18 State Budget

On Tuesday, January 10, Governor Jerry Brown presented his 2017-18 State Budget proposal, dedicating it to California's late "First Dog" Sutter with a message to "save some biscuits for a rainy day." Governor Brown stressed that an "economic downturn is inevitable," with future budget deficits likely to dwarf surpluses California has achieved in recent years. Key proposals affecting special districts include continued property tax restoration, cap-

and-trade revenue allocation, tree-mortality funding, and Proposition 1 water bond spending.

Despite the fiscal slow-down, the proposed budget increases state spending by contributing more money to the state Rainy Day Fund to grow state reserves to 63 percent of its constitutional target in the coming year. In addition, the budget increases funding for education, health care, and other core programs. [Read more...](#)

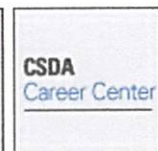

"AB 1661 amended the Government Code Section 53237.1(a) to specify that " If a local agency provides any type of compensation, salary, or stipend to a local agency official of that agency, then all local agency officials of that agency shall receive sexual harassment prevention training and education pursuant to this article." That language is drafted very broadly and is intended to cover elected and appointed officials of cities, special districts, and other local agencies. these officials typically

Sonny Perdue Is Trump's Choice for Agriculture Secretary via The New York Times

President-elect Donald J. Trump selected Sonny Perdue, the former governor of Georgia, to be his secretary of agriculture. Mr. Perdue, who once ran a grain and fertilizer business, was among the first candidates Mr. Trump interviewed for the post. He spent much of his career in the agriculture business before being elected governor and returned to the field in 2011 after leaving office.

High court to decide where WOTUS case should be heard via Agri-Pulse

The Supreme Court will decide whether the 6th Circuit Court of Appeals was right to assert jurisdiction over legal challenges to the "waters of the U.S." rule. The court decided today to grant a petition seeking review of the 6th Circuit's fractured decision, in which that court narrowly determined that it should adjudicate the numerous WOTUS challenges.

EPA's bee decisions are sweet for growers, but they sting environmentalists via Los Angeles Times

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency backed away from tough restrictions on how pesticides can be used while honeybees are pollinating crops, and it declared that three of the pesticides most closely associated with bee deaths are safe in most applications. Those conclusions are likely to allow growers to keep using the chemicals — which are ingredients in dozens of products — to protect millions of acres of soybeans, corn, cotton, vegetables, fruit, and nuts, including 439,000 acres in California. But the documents were a double disappointment to environmentalists, who say scientific studies support bans or at least enforceable restrictions on the chemicals' use.

2016 Was The Hottest Year Yet, Scientists Declare via NPR

Last year, global warming reached record high temperatures — and if that news feels like déjà vu, you're not going crazy. The planet has now had three consecutive years of record-breaking heat.

Conaway names House Ag subcommittee chairs for 115th Congress via Agri-Pulse

House Agriculture Committee Chairman Mike Conaway has tapped Rep. Frank Lucas, R-Okla., to head up the panel's Subcommittee on Conservation and Forestry in the 115th Congress. Lucas was chairman of the Agriculture Committee from 2011-2015.

Outlook: Trump Brings Opportunity, Uncertainty to Agribusiness via Bloomberg BNA

The new year is shaping up to be a busy one for agriculture policy makers and stakeholders, with work on a new farm bill beginning, major rulemaking in the pipeline, and an incoming administration that has pledged to roll back regulations across the board. Agriculture Committee Chairmen Rep. Michael Conaway (R-Texas) and Sen. Pat Roberts (R-Kan.) both return for another round at the helm of their panels, and both say the upcoming five-year farm bill—the premier agriculture policy tool for the federal government—will be a top priority.

Judge allows fracking rules to move ahead via Washington Examiner

A federal court refused to halt the Obama administration's fracking regulations that restrict the venting and flaring of natural gas and methane from oil and gas wells.

Forests Are a Treasure. But Are They Good Investments? via The New York Times

Trees don't watch the stock market. Forests keep growing — and potentially increasing their value — even when inflation surges or the market swoons. Big investors, like university endowments and insurance companies, have long allocated money to timberland in places like Oregon's fir-and-spruce forests, Georgia's pine plantations, and Appalachia's hardwood groves.

Federal Study on Dakota Access Pipeline to Move Forward via ABC News

A federal judge said he won't keep the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers from launching a full environmental study of the \$3.8 billion Dakota Access pipeline's disputed crossing under a Missouri River reservoir in North Dakota.

Trump's EPA pick: Human impact on climate change needs more debate via CNN

Pruitt said the EPA serves a critical mission and detailed how the agency under his leadership would take a dramatically different approach than under President Barack Obama. Pruitt's main argument during the start of his hearing has been that the states should have more power within the EPA. Pruitt said on issues of air quality and water quality and inter-state issues, the EPA is particularly necessary.

Tiny Pollinators Need Wildlife Corridors Too via The Atlantic

By designing a connection between two urban habitats known to support native pollinators—a connection that could be built collaboratively by residents and the city, and replicated elsewhere—Bergmann wanted to not only help pollinators, but also challenge people to think differently about conservation. In some ways, the pathway would be similar to wildlife corridors for larger species, but the project wouldn't necessarily restore or protect habitat; instead, it would design and build it from scratch, in the middle of a landscape long dominated by humans.

PERDUE IS NOMINATED TO HEAD USDA; CLOVIS TO LEAD FARM POLICY

Last Thursday, President Donald Trump nominated former Georgia Governor Sonny Perdue to be the next Secretary of Agriculture. The announcement came after the longest search for an agriculture secretary in modern history, and completed Trump's list of nominations for cabinet positions. Perdue, a member of the president-elect's agricultural advisory team during the campaign, first met with Trump in November about the post.

Perdue, who grew up on a farm in Georgia, is a trained veterinarian, business man, and former two-term governor. No formal announcement has been made on when Perdue's confirmation hearings will begin in the Senate Agriculture Committee.

In addition to Thursday's announcement, Trump has announced Sam Clovis, the top farm policy advisor to his campaign, will lead the USDA transition. Clovis, a Trump surrogate, debated Clinton surrogate Kathleen Merrigan at a Washington, D.C., event in October. At the debate, Clovis expressed the need for the government to "incentivize" more conservation. NACD attended the debate and wrote a blog post – [click here to read it in its entirety](#).
