





### In Response to State Budget Special Districts Seek State Partnership in Confronting Existential Threats

On January 10, Governor Newsom unveiled his \$286.4 billion budget proposal for the 2022-23 fiscal year, dubbed the "California Blueprint". Despite mounting concerns surrounding the Omicron Variant of the Coronavirus, Governor Newsom sought to project a strong fiscal foundation for his budget blueprint. In response to the proposed State Budget, CSDA Chief Executive Officer Neil McCormick urged Governor Gavin Newsom to partner with special districts as the Newsom Administration moves to confront the threats California faces. **TAKE ACTION**

**Property Tax Diversion Bill Pulled Following Opposition from Coalition Led by CSDA**

AB 1543 (Bloom), a measure that would have diverted property tax increment away from special districts, cities, counties, and schools, has failed to advance. This "two-year bill", introduced in 2021, needed to clear two legislative policy hearings this week to stay ahead of legislative deadlines. Following opposition from CSDA and coalition partners, AB 1543 author Assemblymember Richard Bloom withdrew his legislation from consideration. CSDA thanks the Assemblymember for this action.

## NACD THANKS NATURAL RESOURCES COMMITTEE FOR HEARING NACD 75TH ANNIVERSARY RESOLUTION

January 25, 2022



Last week, NACD thanked the U.S. House of Representative's Committee on Natural Resources for considering [H.Res. 641, a Recognition and Celebration of NACD's 75th Anniversary](#).

The resolution, sponsored by Rep. Newhouse (WA-04), was considered during the Natural Resources Subcommittee on Water, Oceans, and Wildlife hearing held today, along with several bills. The committee recognized and celebrated the 75th anniversary of NACD and its commitment to the nation's land during the hearing.

"NACD was founded on the philosophy that conservation decisions should be made at the local level and that we should all strive to advocate for commonsense policy reforms that empower those closest to the land – not bog them down with unnecessary or overburdensome regulations," **said Chairman Newhouse**. "This bipartisan resolution indicates Congress' strong support of NACD's continued mission and a commitment to lifting up the efforts of local districts and conservation throughout the communities we represent. I am proud to be joined by 33 of my colleagues in recognizing NACD and the amazing work they do to promote responsible land management, and I look forward to the work they will do in the next 75 years."

## BELMONT SWCD LAUNCHES CHRISTMAS TREE REPURPOSING PROGRAM



In just a year, the **Belmont Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD)** in Ohio doubled its participation in a Christmas tree repurposing program designed to increase wildlife habitat.

"It's always a concern – depletion of habitat – but it's also just a way of keeping trees out of landfills that will take years to decompose, and a way to give back to nature and back to the earth," **said Belmont SWCD Program Administrator Hannah Carpenter**.

“At Christmas, we are in the spirit of giving to others, but we tend to forget to give back from what we took from nature,” **she said.** “A lot of people don’t know what to do with their Christmas trees, so this is a great alternative.”

Wildlife Specialist Sterling Brumfield, who was hired in October 2020, brought the idea of repurposing the trees shortly after he joined the office. However, there was little time for planning – the district received 23 trees that first year.

This year, the count doubled to close to 50 trees. The Ohio Department of Natural Resources takes some of the trees to various public lands to sink into state-owned ponds to promote fish habitat. They also use others to create natural habitats for smaller forest creatures. Though it will be a few years for the trees to be established enough that wildlife will use it, Carpenter said the program is already seeing success.

As more people become aware and participate in the program, Carpenter said the district could look at expanding to offer additional alternatives, such as assisting individual landowners with wildlife habitat ideas.



## Science Corner: OpenET

*The latest from our science team.*

**Evapotranspiration** is the water that evaporates from the land plus the water that transpires from plants back to the atmosphere. Also known as "ET," evapotranspiration is typically considered a "consumptive" use of water. This means that when water evapotranspires from a field of corn, the water is not available for reuse (at least immediately in the same area). Compare that to "non-consumptive" water use, like using water in your washing machine – where the water flows to a treatment plan and is cleaned for discharge and/or reuse. Because water losses from ET can be substantial, understanding and measuring them is a key part of water management, especially in arid environments. To help fill this challenging to measure component of the water cycle, a consortium of groups came together to create **OpenET**, which uses the "best available science to provide easily accessible satellite-based estimates of evapotranspiration for improved water management across the western US." The online platform uses satellites to estimate the water consumed by plants to inform better water management and planning for improving irrigation efficiency, developing accurate water budgets and tracking water supplies.


## New COVID Requirements effective January 14, 2022

December and January have brought on important revisions to the Cal/OSHA COVID-19 Emergency Temporary Standard (ETS). Cal/OSHA has updated its [FAQs on COVID-19 Prevention Emergency Temporary Standards](#) (ETS) to incorporate new [guidance from the California Department of Public Health \(CDPH\) on isolation and quarantine periods](#). These requirements will take effect on **January 14, 2022**.

**SUBJECT: 2020-21 Special Districts' Financial Transactions Report**

Dear District Fiscal Officer:

This letter provides information regarding the 2020-21 Special Districts' Financial Transactions Report (FTR). Government Code (GC) section 53891 requires that the financial transactions of each local agency be submitted to the State Controller's Office (SCO) within seven months after the close of the fiscal year or within the time prescribed by the Controller, whichever is later. The report must contain underlying data from audited financial statements prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, if this data is available.

The FTR is due to SCO by January 31, 2022. Reporting instructions, including COVID-19 reporting guidance, and information for the 2020-21 Special Districts' FTR are available on the SCO website at [https://www.sco.ca.gov/ard\\_locinstr\\_districts\\_forms.html](https://www.sco.ca.gov/ard_locinstr_districts_forms.html).

To file your FTR, visit Local Government Reporting System Online (LGRS Online) at <https://lgrsonline.sco.ca.gov>. The entity type, username, and password for the web-based reporting program are:

The 2020-21 FTR cover page can be signed electronically on LGRS Online.

Blended component units (BCUs), although legally separate entities, are, in substance, part of the primary special district operations. According to GAAP, the financial data from BCUs should be integrated into the appropriate primary special district funds for reporting purposes. The financial data of BCUs must be included in the primary Special Districts' FTR.

BCUs that meet the requirements to be Special Districts, as defined in GC section 12463(d)(2), must separately prepare and submit the Special Districts' FTR to SCO.


Please note that in accordance with GC section 12464, if the reports are not made in the time, form, and manner required—or there is reason to believe that a report is false, incomplete, or incorrect—SCO is authorized to conduct an investigation to obtain the required information. Any costs incurred by SCO as a result of such an investigation shall be borne by the district.

## Top Ten Reporting Issues for Special Districts' Financial Transactions Report

1. A Special District that has no financial transactions during the year must file the Cover Page form and the General Information form of the Special Districts' Financial Transactions Report, stating "No Activity" on the Cover Page form. A Special District that has no financial transactions but has outstanding debt taken out in the Special District's name must report the debt and any debt payments on the appropriate Debt and Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balances forms.
2. The activity type must reflect the services the Special District provides. Select the type of governmental/enterprise activity for which this report is being prepared.
3. Major variances require footnotes. If there is an overall reporting change, add an explanation in the Comments form. Access the footnote panel by double-clicking on the field in which the balance was reported. Invalid footnotes will be questioned by staff upon review of the Financial Transactions Report (FTR). Simply noting "Correct," "Confirmed OK," or "increase/decrease" is not acceptable. Please indicate what caused the variance (i.e., New AB 1234 law enforcement grant).
4. The Other fields on the revenue and expenditure forms are for items that do not apply to a hard-coded field elsewhere on the form. Please review all of the fields on the forms before reporting an item as Other. A footnote is required for those entries.
5. Include a footnote to explain the reason for a prior period adjustment exceeding 20% of the Fund Balance/Net Position, Beginning of Period.
6. Report residual equity transfers and transfers of capital assets as Transfer In and Transfer Out. Include a footnote to explain why and where a transfer was made.
7. The Appropriations Limit Information form must be completed by all special districts that receive property taxes and are subject to the provisions of California Constitutional Article XIII B. Refer to California Constitutional Article XIII B for specific information on this requirement. If the Special District is exempt from having an appropriation, note that in the General Comment form. Failure to report your Appropriations Limit might affect your mandated cost reimbursement.

8. If the Special District has any debt reported on the debt forms, the activity reported on the debt form must match the activity on the governmental/enterprise form (i.e., Fire Protection activity reported on the governmental form must have Fire Protection selected as the activity type on the debt form). All debt reported must have Principal and Interest (P&I) payments. If there are no P&I payments, include footnotes to explain why there are no current-year payments.
  - Long-Term Debt
    - Principal Amount Issued During Fiscal Year
      - Report the total amount of principal **issued** during the fiscal year on the appropriate Long-Term Debt form.
      - Use a separate form for each debt issued.
      - For Governmental Activities, the principal amount issued must also be reflected on the Governmental Activity's Revenues, Expenditures, and Change in Fund Balance form, on a Long-Term Debt Proceeds line.
    - Principal Amount Matured During Fiscal Year
      - Report the amount of principal paid during the fiscal year on the Long-Term Debt form. Do not include the current portion of principal amounts that are payable in the following fiscal year or the interest payment during the fiscal year.
      - For Governmental Activities, the principal payments reported must also be reflected on the Governmental Activity's Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance form on the Retirement of Long-Term Debt line.
    - Interest Payment During the Fiscal Year
      - Report the amount of interest paid during the fiscal year on the Long-Term Debt Form.
      - Report interest payments on the Interest on Long-Term Debt/Interest Expense line of the Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance form of the governmental or enterprise activity related to the debt.
  - Other Long-Term Debt
    - Do not include liability type debts that have no P&I payments [e.g. Compensated Absences and Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB)] or interfund loans (e.g., copiers, vehicles, etc.) on the Long-Term Debt forms as Other Long-Term Debt.
9. Improvement District, Special Assessment, Mello-Roos, and Mark Roos Bonds
  - Improvement District (1911 Act, 1913 Act, and 1915 Act), Other Special Assessment, Mello-Roos, and Marks-Roos bonds and Other Nonagency debts are liabilities of property owners to bondholders and not primary liabilities of the local agency. Any transactions and balances relating to these bonds should not be reported elsewhere in the Financial Transaction Report, but on Long-Term Debt form only. Unless the debt is backed fully by the faith and credit of the government or fully or partly backed by some other type of the general government commitment.
10. We cannot grant extensions to submit reports. If you are unable to submit your report, please contact the Special Districts' Reporting Unit by email at [SDsupport@sco.ca.gov](mailto:SDsupport@sco.ca.gov) or by telephone at (916) 327-1017. Audited financial statements can also be submitted electronically to the same email address. You must submit the signed Cover Page and the Bureau of the Census form.



# NORTHWEST MOSQUITO AND VECTOR CONTROL DISTRICT

PUBLIC HEALTH GOVERNMENT AGENCY

## Notice of Intent to Apply Public Health Pesticides for Vector Control Purposes to Surface Waters and Waters of the U.S. Within Western Riverside County.

- The Northwest Mosquito & Vector Control District intends to make public health pesticide applications to, over and adjacent to constructed conveyances, surface waters and other waters of the U.S. owned and controlled by an entity other than the District for vector control purposes per the requirements of the General NPDES Permit for Biological and Residual Discharges for Vector Control Applications.
- The District's activities are conducted year-round within a 300-mile areas situated in the western portion of the County of Riverside. The areas that will actually or potentially impacted by District activities include the following: the incorporated cities of Calimesa, Canyon Lake, Corona, Lake Elsinore, Eastvale, Jurupa Valley, Norco and Riverside. The District also controls vectors in the northwest portion of Riverside County including the following areas of Coronita, El Cerrito, Glen Avon, Highgrove, Home Gardens, Woodcrest and other unincorporated areas within the boundaries of the Northwest Mosquito and Vector Control District. Additionally, the District may be requested to provide vector control in the sphere of influence area (presently vector control is provided by the County). In addition to the above mentioned the District at times may implement vector control methods in areas adjacent to the District jurisdiction pursuant the California Health and Safety Code.
- The NPDES Permit requirements for listing of the Public Health Pesticides anticipated to be used were modified from the previous permit, to the new permit, issued in 2016. The newer requirements specify that any pesticide product can be used that contains approved active ingredients, provided all pesticide label restrictions and instructions are followed. In addition, the minimum risk pesticides have been exempted from the FIFRA requirements. The following tables list the active ingredients approved for the FIFRA regulated pesticides.

Active ingredients for larval mosquito control:

**PURPOSE**

As required by Provision VIII.B of the Statewide General National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit for the Residual Aquatic Pesticides Discharges to Waters of the United States from Algae and Aquatic Weed Control Applications, General Permit No. CAG990005 (General Permit), the District hereby provides notice of its intent to apply aquatic pesticide within its stormwater drainage facilities as part of its normal operations and maintenance activities. The District utilizes aquatic pesticides as a feasible method to maintain the design capacity of its drainage facilities and to minimize flood hazards.

**TIME PERIOD**

Applications will occur throughout the year.

**LOCATION**

Applications will occur within the District's drainage facilities and rights of way.
