# I.PRELIMINARY FUNCTIONS

# Approval of Agenda

President Corona asks for a motion to approve the agenda and minutes as presented. Director Parkes seconded. With no further discussion, President Corona calls for a vote. Unanimous vote-5-0.

# **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

Margaret Meyncke had started a new group called Temecula Valley Native Plant Network spoke regarding saying that the group is a new group started locally, it is unaffiliated and has no sponsoring

organization consisting of educators, professors, professional people and plant enthusiasts. The goal is to promote native plants and those that are planting can be put on a map so they can be tracked by others interested in their program. She is also bringing it to the attention of cities, schools, libraries and other organizations and wanted the TEAM to know about them.

Karen Hanson also spoke who has started a Butterfly Garden project and is also involved in the Temecula Valley Native Plant Network. She further explained that the Winchester Creek Park has a Butterfly Garden. She went on to say that Temecula to start more Butterfly parks and is speaking to different cities to talk to them about changing their guidelines through the planning departments. AD Neugebauer asked about how the line is drawn between native and drought tolerant plants and how those overlap also how invasives are incorporated into that plan. With no further public speakers the Board moved on.

# II. ACTION ITEMS

# Item 1: Update and review of final signed Vegetation Management Contract with Flood Control-

President Corona proceeded to explain that the final year of the 5 year Vegetation Management Contract with Flood Control and that the contract has been signed for the remaining year. The initial hope that the contract could be amended to accommodate the Murrieta Creek work which was discussed at previous meetings. However, the contract did include the VV channel which is east of the Temecula Hospital. The Murrieta Creek project will be discussed in the next year's contract. By then TEAM and Flood Control will have a better idea if Army Corps will be continuing the remainder of the project. There was very positive feedback from Flood Control to continue another with another 5 year contract at the end of fiscal year 2023 and potentially expand to more projects. No further discussion necessary.

# Item 2: Update on Greer Ranch Conservation Easement, responsibilities and progress of HOA/Lennar-

President Corona proceeded to explain to the Board the history of the acquisition of the Greer Ranch Conservation Easement which was established over 15 years ago. She noted that although TEAM RCD has continued to fulfill its obligations under the originally signed documents however, in the last few years there has been a discussions as to the exact responsibilities of the HOA and TEAM RCD. In doing some research it was discovered that Lennar (the original developer) had not completed the formality of turning over the final legal ownership to the Greer Ranch HOA. So at this time, Lennar and Greer Ranch are working on finalizing this process and TEAM RCD will continue to provide the quarterly inspections and also the annual report to Greer Ranch.

She also gave the Board an update on the most recent quarterly reports that are being performed by Inland Empire RCD on behalf of TEAM RCD.

Director Biancardi then reminded President Corona that the Consent Calendar may not have been approved at the beginning of the meeting. President Corona asked for a motion to accept the consent calendar to include correspondence and financial reports. Motion seconded by Director Biancardi. No further discussion, motion passed 5-0.

Item 3-Update, Discussion and potential approval on current progress on Cal-Recycle grants and potential submission of applications- Director Biancardi proceeded to discuss the background of the CalRecycle programs. In summary, it is a farm and ranch solid waste cleanup program that, with the proper zoning, would allow citizens that own such property and have had solid waste or trash on their property, Cal-Recycle provides clean up grants for farmers and ranchers or owners of qualified properties. She also indicated that as an individual one cannot apply but must go through a district such as TEAM RCD. She also provided the Board with an update as to the contacts she has put together and posted with the various agencies with the flyer she has created. She also indicated that she has sent the flyer off to many people in Anza, Aguanga, Sage area and the High Country Journal. President Corona suggested that another contact would be the Back Country Horseman a group that rides up in the Anza/Aguanga area. Director Biancardi indicated that she would do so. Director Biancardi also spoke of Homeland having a lot of challenges, although Homeland is not within our district. Director Corona also mentioned that she would reach out to the Riverside County Farm Bureau.

Item 4-Update on SALC grants and discussion on potential for NACD grants- Executive Director for Inland Empire RCD Mandy Parkes took the floor and proceeded to discuss the SALC grants that had been up for discussion in previous meetings. She proceeded to say that IERCD had a SALC grant and described the challenges that TEAM RCD might find in taking on a large grant from a major Bureau of the State without sufficient staff and a tax base, the challenges of meeting the deliverables with any large grant. She also suggested that perhaps NACD grants may be easier for the District to manage with a partnership with other RCD's such as Inland Empire or Mission or perhaps all three. She described how with the tax base her district works with and the additional staff, how they manage their SALC grants. The NACD grants may work better in that TEAM would not have to wait for the monies to come after the grant is complete and they are very flexible in being able to change should challenges arise that may have to redirect the focus of the grant. She also mentioned the CARCD is also an organization that we could partner with other RCD's that would be something that would be advantageous for TEAM RCD.

Ms. Parkes went on to describe several grants that Inland Empire is working on including the regional fire and forestry capacity building grant that deals with actual treatment, fuels treatment, dead tree removal. But there are many others and exploring the possibilities would be probably be very beneficial for TEAM RCD. President Corona added that she saw the challenges of fulfilling grant requirements in order to finally get paid for the grant itself when doing the Boot Strap grants a few years back. Although TEAM finally got paid there was a tremendous amount of back and forth to ensure all the correct paperwork was submitted.

AD Neugebauer noted that he just wanted state that what TEAM RCD has been able to establish and achieve has been astonishing and that due to the work of the Board and the relationships that have been built with different entities, RCWD, Inland Empire and Mission RCD's, SAWA and others the District has finally started to thrive and so TEAM is in more of a position to start taking on these grants with partners. Director Biancardi asked about the Americorps Program and if IERCD had worked with those. Ms. Parkes responded that they have and things have worked out well for them. Ms. Parkes concluded by summarizing the various grants that might work for TEAM and offered to help wherever possible.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

Item 1: Discussion and potential approval for TEAM RCD to host a Regional RCD meeting- President Corona noted that there has been discussions with Ms. Parkes to collaborate on a potential Regional Meeting for Southern California prior to the annual CARCD meeting. The decision was made to have an in person meeting hopefully on A Saturday since it is more convenient for people to come. President Corona mentioned that she had spoken with Jeff Brandt of CDFW Cannabis division, and the remaining RCD's would be invited which would include Riverside-Corona, San Jacinto, Coachella Valley, Inland Empire and Mission RCD to see who would like to attend. The decision was made for the President to find a location in Temecula the first of second week in November. President Corona said she would find some locations and then reach out to the other RCD's to see what dates might work and what the potential attendance would be. November 5 and 12<sup>th</sup> were tentative dates to consider. Margaret Meyncke, guest, was recognized by the chair because she wanted to know if the public was allowed to attend such a meeting and it was indicated that, yes, the public could come but were required to pay for their own lunch if they were attending. President Corona made a motion to have TEAM RCD host the Regional meeting in November. Seconded by Randy Feeney. Motion passed unanimously 5-0.

Item 2: discussion and Potential Approval of Shared Employee w/ IERCD- President Corona discussed the potential of sharing an employee to do some of the outstanding filing and administrative work for TEAM RCD on a shared basis with IERCD. Ms. Parkes indicated that we already have an MOU and this would provide the employee that they have to have more hours and help expand her knowledge by working with other RCD's. Ms. Parkes informed the Board that she has an agreement and the costs would be shared once a regular schedule is coordinated with IERCD and regular hours and times of work are arranged on a monthly basis. President Corona asked for a motion. Director Biancardi made a motion to accept a shared employee with IERCD, Second by Newt Parkes. Motion passed 5-0.

Item 3-Discussion and Update on Clinton Keith Property-President Corona gave the Board an update on the 75 acres of property owned by TEAM RCD off of Clinton Keith Road that had been purchased in 2009. The District has some mitigation monies that go with the property and the Board had decided that perhaps it could be given to another Conservation organization to maintain and work. The President has been in discussions with Rivers and Lands Conservancy to see if they would be interested in taking the property. WE have asked SAWA to do a site assessment to enable to have further discussions with RLC. It is hoped that TEAM should be able to get a report within 2-3 weeks and hopefully have something to discuss at the next meeting.

Item 4-Discussion and potential approval for document archiving, storage and duplicative documents-President Corona reported that the Board has a lot of duplicative paperwork and would like to have it scanned and stored in the Cloud. The Board would keep the required documents in the files however duplicative ones would be scanned (if they had not been already). President asked for a motion to go forward with storage of old documents to the cloud. Newt Parkes made the motion and Randy Feeney seconded the motion. No further discussion, motion passed 5-0.

**OLD BUSINESS** 

Item 1-Update on Homeless Monitoring- Director Newt Parkes noted in his report that during the June meeting he reported that one of the project sites Tucalota Creek had a homeless issue associated with it. It has been cleaned up and hasn't had any homeless return. Two other sites however still have not been addressed (Santa Gertrudis and Temecula Creek III) have lots of activity and continued activity. We have reported that to the appropriate city departments have been contacted and we will continue to monitor. He also mentioned that Lake Elsinore has yet to find a replacement for Nicole Daily of the homeless task force however they continue to be on top of grant applications and continue their SWAG and Anchor work. Director Parkes met with Lindsay Sisti and Brian Ambrose who are in charge of the homeless outreach and coordination for the City of Murrieta have met with Director Parkes and agreed to speak at our September meeting.

Director Biancardi bought up a side note that Mike Woods from City of Temecula was interested in using goats for vegetation management in a particular area and she reports that Mr. Woods keeps reporting it to Flood Control but they don't do the vegetation management in that particular area. It might be managed by TEAM RCD but the exact site wasn't specified. Director Biancardi wanted to know if it was TEAM's choice of locations or Flood Control. President Corona noted that it was up to Flood Control to choose those sites and that is dependent on their budget. She also noted that if there were other areas that belong to the City that we could certainly work on the areas they want. We would just send SAWA over to do a site inspection and give the City an amount for the work. We are the last group that will go in as a rule. It will usually be law enforcement, assistance groups for the homeless, City and/or hazmat or responsible party, wait 90 days to see if there is return of encampment and then TEAM RCD can do work. Director Biancardi also wanted to know what was the connection between the RCD and the homeless monitoring that was getting reported on. President Corona responded by letting the Board know that this was something she had requested at the beginning of the contract in order to keep an eye on the sites on a regular basis so not too many homeless could move in before something was addressed. We did not want the Flood Control projects we were working on getting overrun by encampments.

**Item 2: SAWA Update-** A.D. Neugebauer said that it had been pretty quiet so there was nothing new to report.

Item 3: Crop/Swap and AIEP Program Report and presentation of new AirTable program- Director Feeney showed a presentation of the new Airtable Platform that TEAM will be using going forward to work on shared projects with our partners. It made it so there is a more effective way for multiple agencies to work on projects without the back and forth of e-mailing on a standard e-mail stream. It focuses on accountability for the people involved but also allows for only those individuals involved to address certain issues while allowing managerial and supervisors to oversee the work without having to get involved in responding to every little item.

Director Feeney showed on the overhead the basics of the program and not only how it is working for TEAM, RCWD and for Mission in our water audit and crop swap programs, but how it can work for other programs that we have with other organizations. Director Biancardi asked if it could be used for the Cal-Recycle Program and she was told yes. It is hopeful that TEAM will be able to get SAWA and Flood Control on the projects to make it easier for all to review shared projects together.

**Item 5:** Update on Flood Control Santa Margarita Outreach Program-Director Bryant reached out to SAWA and has come up with a date for September 28<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup> for a watershed clean up. Pablo got a

firm commitment from Pam Nelson with Sierra Clb to provide people for the community aspect of it. By next meeting he will have a more firm report on the actual nuts and bolts of operation for the event. Nothing more to report.

Item 5: Report on Anza/Aguanga Area- Director Biancardi had nothing to report.

With no further items, President Corona mad a motion to adjourn. Director Bryant made the motion. Director Parkes seconded the motion. Motion passed 5-0.




#### Bathroom Bill and Federal Infrastructure Funding Mandate Among Measures Held Under Submission Last Week

#### CSDA Releases Mid-Year Legislative Report as Legislature Returns for Final Push

The California State Legislature reconvened from its summer recess this week to complete its work on hundreds of pending bills before August 31. Governor Gavin Newsom will then have one month to sign or veto any legislation arriving on his desk at the conclusion of the legislative session. Download CSDA's Mid-Year Legislative Report for an in-depth look on the status of CSDA-priority legislation at this key juncture in the legislative process. CSDA — with the help of our special district members — successfully advocated on numerous bills in connection with their house of origin deadline. A number of CSDA budgetary priorities were also included in the signed 2022-23 California State Budget. The Legislature reconvened on August 1 with the first legislative deadline being August 12 for fiscal committees to meet and report on bills, and for bills to be removed from the committee's suspense file. From August 15-31, there will be no policy committee meetings, only Assembly and Senate floor sessions, with August 25 being the last day to amend bills this year.

August 31 is the last day for each house to pass legislation. CSDA is already communicating with the Governor's office to advocate on legislation heading toward passage. September 30 will be the last day for Governor Gavin Newsom to sign or veto bills that have reached his desk.

CSDA will continue to work diligently on behalf of all special districts, throughout the last remaining weeks of the legislative year. For all the latest advocacy updates, be sure to subscribe to CSDA's <a href="Advocacy News">Advocacy News</a> community.

#### Proponents Submit 1.4 Million Signatures to Qualify Initiative Limiting Ability of Voters and State and Local Governments

Proponents of Initiative #21-0042A1 submitted 1,429,529 signatures by the August 2 deadline to qualify the constitutional amendment for voter consideration. Should county elections officials confirm the validity of at least 997,139 signatures, the initiative to limit the ability of voters and state and local governments to raise revenues for government services will be placed on the November 2024 statewide ballot. CSDA is calling on all special districts to join the more than 150 local governments that have already passed resolutions in opposition to the costly measure.

The purported "Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act," sponsored by the <u>California Business Roundtable</u> ("CBRT"), is the most consequential proposal to limit the ability of the state and local governments to enact, modify, or expand taxes, assessments, fees, and property-related charges since the passage of Proposition 218 (1996) and Proposition 26 (2010). If enacted, public agencies would face a drastic rise in litigation that could severely restrict their ability to meet essential services and infrastructure needs.

County elections officials are in the process of conducting a random sample verification of the 1.4 million signatures submitted by proponents. They have 38 working days from the submission of signatures to confirm whether the random sample process yields a sufficient number of valid signatures. If the random sample verifies 110 percent of required signatures, then the initiative qualifies automatically. If it yields less than 95 percent of necessary valid signatures, then it fails. If it yields less than 110 percent, but greater than 95 percent, then elections officials receive another 30 working days to conduct a full check of all signatures. Interested parties can track the results of the ongoing count on the website of the California Secretary of State.

CSDA has joined a coalition of local government leaders in adopting an "Oppose" position on Initiative 21-0042A1 and encourages all special districts, partners, and community leaders to join the coalition.






#### NACD Attends SWCS Annual Meeting



NACD participated in the Soil and Water Conservation Society (SWCS) annual meeting last week in Denver, CO. The theme this year was "Elevating Conservation to New Heights".

Many breakout and general sessions covered topics of interest to Conservation Districts and NACD Leaders, Staff. as well as our Committees. There were numerous individual studies and reports on conservation success stories. NACD's exhibit booth was visited by a number of existing and new partners. NACD has a long standing strong partnership with the SWCS and has additional work together ahead including collecting and sending a joint delegation in WI next month.

## STRONG PARTNERSHIPS IN KANSAS SERVE VETERANS



On Friday, August 5, the Kansas Association of Conservation Districts (KACD) hosted a field day with the <u>Servicemember Agricultural Vocation Education (SAVE) Farm</u> in Riley County, KS, and the Kansas chapter of the Land Improvement Contractors of America (KLICA).

The SAVE farm began in 2015 as a center for transitioning service members to heal and learn through agricultural education. Through the program, SAVE offers its student with a science knowledge and hands on experience that leaves them with long-term agricultural skills and an an understanding of the importance of producing in an ecologically and economically sustainable way.

This mission fits well with conservation districts and NRCS. SAVE has been involved with both groups from the beginning to accomplish improvement work on the farm as well as to provide learning opportunities to their students.

This field day showcased the planning work of NRCS as well as the field improvement work done by KLICA. Students from Kansas and Oklahoma came out to see the organizations and the work they have accomplished so far. Staff from the **Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts** were also present, and are working with SAVE and KACD to use as examples for their CARES project in Oklahoma.

This shining example shows how conservation districts can leverage partnerships to promote conservation agriculture to benefit multiple stakeholders at the local and state level.



Like many conservation districts, Valencia Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) a 2020 grantee through the joint NACD-NRCS Urban Agriculture Conservation grant initiative, faced many challenges managing the COVID-19 pandemic. However, the district continued making progress at two community garden sites that comprise the East Valencia Urban Gardens Program (EVUGP), thanks in part to their UAC grant.

In a year of transition for EVUGP, the community gardens did well this year thanks in large measure to the heavy lifting of the two garden managers - Ms. Cervantes and Ms. Jimenez - both members of an underserved community within eastern Valencia County. During a recent campaign for re-election to the district board, **Dr. Teresa Smith de Cherif**, Valencia SWCD Vice Chair and one of the individuals responsible for spearheading the garden, **said** "Scores of people in El Cerro Mission, Monterrey Park, and Meadow Lake told me that the gardens have given people joy and a sense of pride in their own work and in their community."



In 2021 the garden's youth interns continued to help the two garden managers plant, water, weed, mulch, and distribute the garden's abundant healthy produce. To do a better service to the garden managers and the youth interns, educational pamphlets were given to the garden workers every week, focusing on topics like soil health, gardening in New Mexico, perma-culturing, and use of beneficial insects and spiders.



As Valencia SWCD looks forward to the future for the gardens, the district will continue to partner with community members important partner Youth Development Inc. (YDI). After several efforts to secure funds for the longterm management of the garden through the county and USDA, the two partners were able to successfully apply for a State of New Mexico Next Generation grant in 2021, which is geared toward educational opportunities within the state.


The district is very excited to take next steps to ensure the continuation of the EVUGP gardens. Throughout 2022, they will lead several educational events, including healthy soils field days. For these events, they will invite people from other community gardens and a list of small organic farmers to come to the gardens and use a sheet mulching technique to reduce weeds (e.g., infestation of goat heads), safe water and improve soil organic materials. This will also be a chance to enlist local farmers and gardeners to join EVUGP as partners.

Valencia SWCD will also continue providing maintenance at the gardens, with plans to replace the drip irrigation system as needed, repair the hoop houses, and prepare seedlings for in-ground plantings. According to Dr. Smith de Cherif, such management of the gardens has helped program participants and other volunteers have learned soil and water conservation techniques and produced some 2,500 pounds of vegetables each year over the last few seasons. "I believe these gardens are vital to the health, wellbeing, and future of our communities," said Dr. Smith de Cherif.





### BREAKING DOWN THE CONSERVATION INVESTMENTS IN INFLATION REDUCTION ACT

On Friday, August 12, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (IRA). Earlier that week, the U.S. Senate passed the IRA by a vote of 51-50. NACD applauded the bill's inclusion of historic investments to support conservation, improve resilience, and address climate change. The IRA is currently set to be signed into law by President Biden later this afternoon.

"NACD is pleased to see continued support from Congress and the administration in conservation program funding," said NACD President Michael Crowder. "We applaud this investment in conservation and natural resource management, and we will continue to advocate for support for these programs that are critical to addressing climate change by improving the health of our soils, watersheds, and forests. We look forward to continuing our work with all members of Congress, on both sides of the aisle, to bring voluntary conservation and natural resource management to the producers and landowners who benefit from these programs."

The IRA includes approximately \$18 billion for voluntary conservation programs administered by the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) between Fiscal Years 2023 and 2026. The bill also prioritizes funding for projects supported by these programs that reduce, capture, or prevent greenhouse gas emissions. The IRA also includes \$1 billion for conservation technical assistance, which allows NRCS and conservation districts across the country to help producers and land managers assess resources needs, develop conservation plans, and implement conservation practices.

"This funding represents a great opportunity for conservation districts and their partners to bring natural resource management efforts into practice," said NACD CEO Jeremy Peters. "Conservation districts are invaluable to the delivery of these programs and their benefits to communities across the country."

NACD is excited to begin working with our agency partners and members to help districts use this funding to support on-the-ground conservation in communities across the country. In the coming weeks, NACD's Government Affairs team will be releasing a series of blog posts detailing the conservation provisions in the IRA and sharing opportunities for districts engage. 



The agenda continued with presentations from Dan Balser, the Ohio State Forester, as well as Brian Bradshaw with USFS, who discussed recent developments in forest products. The day continued with updates from members of NASF and the Southern Group of State Foresters on Keeping Forests' Traditional Forest Market Initiative, Forest Policy, and The Forest Carbon Network. In the afternoon, attendees participated in an activity focused on creating partnerships in the conservation space and heard updates from USFS, the Agroforestry Center, the Society of American Foresters, and the White Oak Initiative.

A field tour was offered to attendees on Wednesday. The group departed for the Speyside Cooperage, a barrel supplier in Jackson, Ohio, to discuss and observe forest product markets. The group then went to Vinton Furnace State Forest to explore forestry management in practice, with a particular focus on white oak management efforts in the region.

The event concluded on Thursday, August 4, with an opportunity for the Forestry Resource Policy Group to meet in person and discuss their work plan and strategic communications. Throughout the meeting, FRPG members had a chance to network with partners and explore opportunities for districts to fulfill needs in the forestry and wildfire space. Districts are well positioned to be partners in implementing on-the-ground forestry management, wildfire prevention, and recovery. <u>Baxter</u> in Georgetown, Delaware, Baxter is a fourth-generation farmer and works with the Sussex Conservation District for conservation planning and best management practices. Baxter Farms is a 2,000+acre farming operation growing corn, soybeans, wheat, and lima beans. The farm utilizes many species of cover crops, including legumes and grasses. The field day gathered district and agency staff, producers, and other local stakeholders to hear from numerous presenters on conservation in action both locally and across the country. NACD Communications Specialist <u>Mariah MacKenzie</u> attended the field day. The event served as an opportunity for attendees to learn about the principles of soil health and see firsthand the impacts that soil health practices have on the field.

The event began with remarks from District Coordinator **David Baird** followed by a presentation from **Rick Clark**, a fifth-generation farmer from Williamsport, Indiana. In 2020, NACD featured the <u>Skagit County Conservation District</u> and their efforts to revise their 2008 county-wide <u>Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP)</u>. What prompted Skagit County to draft the initial CWPP document? The original CWPP was drafted in 2009 by the Skagit Conservation District and was a supplement to the NHMP being updated. At the time of the NHMP update process, the Conservation District had received Title III funds from Skagit County to support Firewise USA Program efforts and a wildfire risk reduction coordinator (me). We also had a veteran Forester on staff who was well informed on the NHMP update process. Recognizing that we were in a good position to provide guidance on the wildfire section of the NHMP plan, we started attending update meetings and offering our services. From there, we recognized that we should have a stand-alone CWPP that accompanied the NHMP that could address more specifics. We had the staff and the funding to develop the CWPP, so we did!

When did Skagit County decide to revise the CWPP?

The CD did an accomplishments update to the CWPP around 2012, but it wasn't until 2019 - 10 years later - that we decided to do a complete revision of the CWPP as part of the NHMP update process. The main impetus for this was that our forester had been working for a couple of years on a new analysis method for wildfire risk that he wanted to use in a new CWPP. He had years of local knowledge and experience around wildfire occurrences, expertise in forest health, and connections to scientists through which he could vet his process. We were also trying to follow the best practices for incorporating the CWPP into the NHMP update process and document recommended by FEMA and connections through the various fire-adapted communities learning networks (WAFAC and FACNET) I was/am involved in.



Dear Fish Passage Community,

You received recent email about an effort underway to clean up Passage Assessment Database (PAD) records across the state focused on non-Caltrans locations. The current focus is on watersheds within <a href="CDFW Region 4">CDFW Region 4</a>. This is a **reminder** that there will be a **webinar on August 16<sup>th</sup>** to introduce and explain this effort. Please refer to the details below.

What: In 2021, the California Passage Assessment Database (PAD) and the California Fish Passage Forum (Forum) launched a major effort to review and update records in the PAD - an important tool used by restoration practitioners, decision-makers, funders, and fish passage professionals across the state to improve fish passage in California. The effectiveness of the PAD is dependent on how accurately its data depicts fish passage barriers in California (including information on their location, status, and other attributes), and representatives from the PAD and the Forum's member organizations are working collaboratively to improve this information for the benefit of partners across the state.

This comprehensive effort, also referred to as the "PAD Plan", is being implemented from south to north according to California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) regions and is focused on non-Caltrans locations within priority (core and candidate) watersheds identified in NOAA Recovery Plans. A key component of the PAD Plan in each CDFW region is the verification of barrier records by local experts.

This effort is complementary to Caltrans effort to update and assess all their crossings providing much needed science and data to the PAD. Now it is the rest of the records that need to be reviewed and updated, as needed.

On **Tuesday, August 16** the PAD and the Forum will host a webinar for fish passage experts with interest and/or knowledge of fish passage barriers in <u>CDFW Region 4 (Central Region</u>). The webinar will introduce participants to this effort, the PAD, Forum, as well as provide an opportunity to discuss current fish passage issues in the region.

The Department of the Interior (Interior) seeks 2-4 million acre feet of cuts from Colorado River water users, and has targeted the Salton Sea region for as much as 500,000 acre feet/year of these cuts. If carried out, such cuts would dwarf the 2003 Quantification Settlement Agreement (QSA) cuts which set the Salton Sea crisis in motion. California has provided roughly \$515 million to address the crisis. While the federal government has estimated the low-end cost of mitigating the *current* deteriorating conditions on federal Salton Sea lands at \$332 million, it has not even provided for these federal land management costs.

"As tribal trustee, Interior has a legal obligation to evaluate and mitigate the impacts of any cuts to Colorado River water use on our tribal lands, especially for disadvantaged Tribes like ours," commented Authority Vice President and Torres Martinez Desert Cahuilla Indians tribal member Altrena Santillanes. "The Tribe recently wrote to Secretary Haaland to highlight that Interior has not complied with these obligations and to ask the Secretary to enter into a formal consultation process with us to evaluate the impact of these proposed federal cuts on our tribal lands prior to taking any action," Santillanes continued.

The Authority has long advocated for assured federal Salton Sea funding to address the existing significant unmet Salton Sea needs associated with the 2003 QSA water transfer. "Together the state and federal costs to address the 2003 QSA transfer of 200,000 acre feet of water out of the Salton Sea basin are likely to be well over \$1 billion," commented Authority Executive Director G. Patrick O'Dowd.

"Interior is now asking our region to make a *substantially* larger conservation commitment to advance the national interest in the Colorado River system and this will require a commensurate and assured federal funding commitment to the Salton Sea and our communities," O'Dowd stated. "Before Interior makes any commitment from this new \$4 billion fund to other Colorado River water users, the impacts on the Salton Sea and our disadvantaged and tribal community of any cuts must be first evaluated and funding set aside from the fund to fully mitigate those impacts, as intended by Congress," O'Dowd concluded.

The City of Temecula's Military Banner Program honors active-duty military personnel currently residing within Temecula's City limits (or having immediate family in the City). These patriotic banners serve as a prominent reminder of our service members.



Military Banners include the official military photo of the service member as well as their name and specific branch of the United States Armed Forces. Military Banners are installed periodically throughout the year along Main Street in Old Town and in front of City Hall and may be displayed for various lengths of time ranging from a few months up to a year or more, depending on installation and demand. Afterwards, the Military Banners are officially presented to the honoree, applicant, and/or family at the City of Temecula's Annual Patriotic Salute to Veterans held in November.

Out of gratitude for their dedication to our country, the City of Temecula takes every opportunity to publicly honor and recognize members of our military. We encourage

you to honor an active-military duty person in your family - The Temecula Way. There is no charge for these banners which can be ordered anytime, as installation occurs throughout the year.

#### **Wildfire Safety Guidelines**

MANMADE AND NATURAL WILDFIRES ARE A SERIOUS THREAT in Southern California. Temecula citizens can protect themselves and their families by following CAL FIRE's "Ready, Set, Go!" guidelines. For more information go to: readyforwildfire.org/prepare-forwildfire/ready-set-go.

BEREADY Create and maintain 100 feet of defensible space.
Flammable materials like dry grass and dead vegetation within 30 feet of your home must be removed and replaced with drought-tolerant, fire-resistant plants. The next 70 feet of the defensible space zone should be thinned so that no more than 50% of open space is covered by plants more than 4 inches in height. Harden your home against flying embers by cleaning your rain gutters, roof, and outdoor areas of flammable debris.

GET SET Prepare ahead of time for a quick evacuation. Create an emergency preparedness plan that includes a meeting place and what to take. The three steps to getting set:

- Create a Wildfire Action Plan that includes evacuation planning for your home, family and pets.
- Assemble an Emergency Supply Kit for each person in your household.
- Fill Out a Family Communication Plan that includes important evacuation and contact information.

BE READY TO GO Give yourself and your loved ones the best chance at surviving a wildfire by evacuating early and taking the precautions necessary to stay safe.

#### TIPS TO GET YOUR HOME READY

- Create and maintain a 100 feet defensible space zone.
- \* Properly clear and dispose of green waste like vegetation, grass, and other yard clippings.
- Invest in fire-safe landscaping. For more information about creating a fire-safe landscape,
   visit. readyforwildfire.org/prepare-for-wildfire/get-ready/fire-smart-landscaping.
- Use equipment the RfGHT way. Lawn mowers, metal bladed trimmers, chain saws, and other machinery can start a wildfire if not used properly. Avoid rocks that can create sparks and cause a fire in dry grass. Ensure portable, gasoline-powered equipment like tractors and chainsaws are equipped with spark arresters, remain free of carbon build-up, and only have the recommended level of fuel.
- Build or upgrade your roof with metal or tile to strengthen your home's defenses. Roofs have the highest risk of being destroyed during a wildfire.
- $^\circ$  **Home address numbers should be highly visible,** readable from the road, and a minimum of  $_4$  inches in size with contrasting or reflective numbers.
- Protect open outdoor vents (chimney, dryer, etc.) by covering openings with 1/8-inch to 1/4-inch metal mesh or baffles to prevent flying embers from entering your home. Baffles are devices used to restrain air or fluid flow and prevent stray embers. Be aware that fire embers from distant fires can travel airborne over many miles.

#### Salton Sea Authority Applauds Senate Passage of Major Salton Sea Funding

\$4 Billion in Climate Drought Funding
Will Mitigate Salton Sea Impacts of Future Colorado River Cuts

The Salton Sea Authority (Authority) today applauded Senate passage of major legislation to provide \$4 billion to address drought, particularly targeting the Salton Sea. The legislation was included in the Inflation Reduction Act climate bill by Senators Feinstein and Padilla to ensure that the impacts of any federal Colorado River water cuts on the Salton Sea are fully mitigated. The legislation is expected to pass the House of Representatives and be signed into law next week.

"Our disadvantaged and tribal communities have paid with their lives and livelihoods for past state-imposed water cuts to our region," stated Authority President Louis Plancarte. "There is simply no doubt that, without assured federal mitigation funding, the much more sizable federal cuts now under active consideration will decimate public health in our region. I commend our Congressional delegation for their strong leadership in moving this essential legislation forward," Plancarte added.

"With its Justice40 initiative and Executive Order 14008, the Biden administration has made environmental justice the centerpiece of its agenda, committing to invest at least 40% of federal investments like those in this climate drought bill to deliver benefits to communities like ours that have been historically marginalized and overburdened by pollution," noted Alex Cardenas, Authority Director and Board Treasurer. "With this \$4 billion in targeted funding,

the President now has ample resources to back up this at minimum 40% commitment with major action," stated Cardenas.

The Department of the Interior (Interior) seeks 2-4 million acre feet of cuts from Colorado River water users, and has targeted the Salton Sea region for as much as 500,000 acre feet/year of these cuts. If carried out, such cuts would dwarf the 2003 Quantification Settlement Agreement (QSA) cuts which set the Salton Sea crisis in motion. California has provided roughly \$515 million to address the crisis. While the federal government has estimated the low-end cost of mitigating the *current* deteriorating conditions on federal Salton Sea lands at \$332 million, it has not even provided for these federal land management costs.

"As tribal trustee, Interior has a legal obligation to evaluate and mitigate the impacts of any cuts to Colorado River water use on our tribal lands, especially for disadvantaged Tribes like ours," commented Authority Vice President and Torres Martinez Desert Cahuilla Indians tribal member Altrena Santillanes. "The Tribe recently wrote to Secretary Haaland to highlight that Interior has not complied with these obligations and to ask the Secretary to enter into a formal consultation process with us to evaluate the impact of these proposed federal cuts on our tribal lands prior to taking any action," Santillanes continued.

The Authority has long advocated for assured federal Salton Sea funding to address the existing significant unmet Salton Sea needs associated with the 2003 QSA water transfer. "Together the state and federal costs to address the 2003 QSA transfer of 200,000 acre feet of water out of the Salton Sea basin are likely to be well over \$1 billion," commented Authority Executive Director G. Patrick O'Dowd.

"Interior is now asking our region to make a *substantially* larger conservation commitment to advance the national interest in the Colorado River system and this will require a commensurate and assured federal funding commitment to the Salton Sea and our communities," O'Dowd stated. "Before Interior makes any commitment from this new \$4 billion fund to other Colorado River water users, the impacts on the Salton Sea and our disadvantaged and tribal community of any cuts must be first evaluated and funding set aside from the fund to fully mitigate those impacts, as intended by Congress," O'Dowd concluded.





WHEREAS, TEAM RCD is well acquainted with, and confident in the abilities, past performance, and services provided by IERCD; and

WHEREAS, TEAM RCD believes that IERCD personnel can assist in the provision of such services to TEAM RCD at a high level of quality on terms financially acceptable to TEAM RCD; and

WHEREAS, TEAM RCD wishes to engage IERCD for provision of its personnel to provide support for development and facilitation of education, outreach, conservation, enhancement, and restoration project work ("Services").

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties hereto, intending to be legally bound, agree as follows:

- Contractual Relationship: The substance of IERCD's services hereunder will be that of
  providing personnel to TEAM RCD to provide the Services, as well as necessary payroll
  and human resources functions for such assigned personnel.
- 2. Employment Status: During the term of this Agreement, IERCD personnel will remain regular employees of IERCD, eligible for compensation and benefits provided to him or her as specified in the employment relationship with IERCD. Employee will not be entitled to accrue or receive any compensation or employment benefits from TEAM RCD in connection with the Services provided under this Agreement. IERCD will indemnify and hold TEAM RCD harmless from and against any employment-related claims by IERCD personnel. IERCD retains all right to direct its personnel, however, TEAM RCD may request work within the general guidelines of this Agreement directly from IERCD personnel.
- 3. Assignment: During the term of this Agreement, IERCD agrees to temporarily incorporate into personnel duties and work schedule the responsibility to perform the Services on behalf of TEAM RCD in furtherance of this Agreement. Such Services may include meetings, telephone calls, site visits, direction of contractors, and preparing and making reports and presentations to TEAM RCD's Board of Directors related to Services rendered. Services performed by IERCD personnel will be performed where best suited to TEAM RCD, most likely in TEAM RCD facilities. Use of TEAM RCD equipment and supplies, such as telephones, computers, and printers will be allowed in the furtherance of such Services.

- 4. Conditions of Employment: TEAM RCD understands and acknowledges that it is entering into this Agreement on the basis of its familiarity and confidence in the skills and experience of IERCD's services, and has not relied, in any way, on representations or promises of IERCD. As a condition of IERCD's agreement to provide the Services under this Agreement, TEAM RCD agrees to indemnify and hold IERCD harmless from any claims, damages or liability arising out of the provision of Services hereunder, including but not limited to claims, damages or liability to TEAM RCD or any third party, arising out of alleged negligence.
  - During the term of this Agreement IERCD shall be responsible for the full payment of wages to IERCD personnel regardless of payment from TEAM RCD to IERCD.
  - b. IERCD shall be responsible for the administration, collection, and disbursement of its personnel W-2 payroll including the calculation of gross wage entitlement, withholdings from Employee's wages and payment of those withholdings.
  - c. IERCD shall be responsible for all employer tax-reporting functions as required by law, and shall have the sole right to responsibility to evaluate, reassign, discipline, or terminate the employment of its personnel. IERCD shall provide prompt written notice to TEAM RCD of any action taken which results in IERCD personnel being unavailable for duty under the terms of this Agreement.
  - d. IERCD and TEAM RCD shall cooperate with one another to ensure compliance with all wage-and-hour; safety; and employment-related federal and state laws and regulations, including, but not limited to, the Family Medical Leave Act, California Family Rights Act, California Fair Employment and Housing Act, American with Disabilities Act, Fair Labor Standards Act, and Cal/OSHA or OSHA safety rules.
  - e. TEAM RCD agrees to comply with all legally imposed safety practices and procedures with respect to IERCD personnel activities. TEAM RCD shall report all work-related accidents, injuries or illnesses to IERCD within twenty-four (24) hours of any such occurrence. TEAM RCD further agrees to: (i) provide IERCD's DWC-1 form or equivalent (for purposes of workers' compensation) promptly to IERCD personnel if involved in a work-related accident, injury or illness; and, (ii) facilitate receipt of emergency medical care if needed with a follow-up notification to IERCD.
  - TEAM RCD shall pay all invoices submitted by IERCD in accordance with this Agreement within 30 days of receipt.
- 5. Changes in Employment Status: IERCD shall not engage in any significant preplanned termination or lay-off that would materially affect the Services under this Agreement, nor implement any increase or reduction in pay, without first providing TEAM RCD with thirty (30) days advance written notice. In the event of an emergency or when IERCD determines that such notice is not feasible, IERCD. shall provide TEAM RCD with at least two (2) days advance written notice.

- 6. Term: The term of this Agreement shall commence upon the Effective Date specified above, and shall continue for one (1) year from that date. The Agreement shall thereafter automatically renew for successive one (1) year terms, unless terminated as set forth in this Agreement. Either party to this Agreement can terminate the Agreement by providing at least thirty (30) day written notice of intent to terminate. Either party may terminate this Agreement due to a breach of any provision herein by the other party, where the breach is not remedied within seven (7) days after written notice of that breach is provided to the other party in accordance with Section 8, below.
- 7. Compensation and Billing: TEAM RCD agrees to compensate IERCD for all the Services performed under this Agreement on a "time and materials" basis for time expended by IERCD personnel, including time spent travelling to and from TEAM RCD's offices and to worksites in connection with the Services provided to TEAM RCD, plus mileage and expenses, including the cost of materials and supplies used in the provision of the Services under this Agreement. The rate for mileage reimbursement will be based upon Internal Revenue Service's business mile rate. Time expended by personnel will be billed on an hourly basis based on attached Rate Sheet per hour for actual time spent by IERCD personnel in performing services to TEAM RCD hereunder.

The hourly rate is intended to cover IERCD personnel's effective hourly cost of salary and benefits, the use of IERCD offices and office equipment, and IERCD's costs of administering this Agreement, preparing invoices and scheduling personnel time. IERCD will invoice TEAM RCD on a monthly basis, and payment will be due within thirty (30) days after the date of mailing the invoice. The invoices will detail the number of hours expended on a daily basis and mileage and expense charges. Payments made more than thirty (30) days from the date of the invoice will be subject to a late fee/interest charge of the lesser of (i) six percent (6%) per annum, or (ii) the maximum amount permitted under applicable law, from the thirty-first (31st) day after the date of the invoice to the date the invoiced amount is paid.

8. **Notices:** All notices, invoices, reports and other communications hereunder shall be sent to the designated representative for the party to which it is directed, by U.S. Mail, overnight courier delivery, or email directed as follows:

Severability: If any provision of this Agreement is found by any court or other legal authority, or is agreed by the parties, to be in conflict with any code or regulation governing its subject, the conflicting provision shall be considered null and void. If the effect of nullifying any conflicting provision is such that a material benefit of the agreement to either party is lost, the Agreement may be terminated at the option of the affected party. In all other cases, the remainder of the Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.

- Amendment: No amendment of this Agreement shall be valid or enforceable unless in writing and signed by both parties.
- 11. Entire Agreement: This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and there are no oral or written understandings, representations, or commitments of any kind, express or implied which are not expressly set forth herein.
- 12. No Third Party Beneficiaries: Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to give any rights or benefits to anyone other than IERCD and TEAM RCD.
- 13. Counterparts: This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts. Each shall be deemed an original and all, taken together, shall constitute one and the same instrument.

## How Can We Help our Agricultural Community and Producers Thrive?

The San Diego region has the highest number of small and certified organic farms of any county in the nation  $^{[1]}$ , yet according to the 2015 California Farmland Conversion Report, our region has consistently ranked in the top 10 counties in California with the largest net loss of irrigated farmland since 1994. From 2019 to 2020, land dedicated to commercial agriculture decreased by almost 10,000 acres  $^{[2]}$ .

The San Diego Agricultural Planning Program will identify, monitor, and assess the ownership of active agricultural lands within the San Diego region to determine effective methods to strengthen agricultural production and the growing agricultural economy.

This two-year planning grant is funded by the California Department of Conservation with Capand-Trade proceeds through the Sustainable Agricultural Lands Conservation Program (SALC). The project is managed by the San Diego Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) and coordinated by the Resource Conservation District of Greater San Diego County (RCDGSDC).


