I.PRELIMINARY FUNCTIONS

Approval of Agenda

President Corona asks for a motion to approve the agenda to include the Consent Calendar, correspondence, financials and minutes as presented. Director Biancardi moves to make the motion, Director Parkes seconds. President Corona calls for a vote. Vote-4-0.

President Corona takes a moment to introduce new Director Pablo Bryant and asks him to tell the Board a little about himself. Director Bryant states that he manages the Santa Margarita Ecological Reserve

and has been there for over 20 years. He states that he has been in the Valley since the mid-90s as a research associate and married, two kids, five dogs and that he is interested in cleaning up the watershed.

District Counsel Cushman asks if Director Bryant has been sworn in yet and he responds by saying that he had not at which point District Counsel states that he will just be an observer for this particular meeting.

II. ACTION ITEMS

Item 1: Discussion and potential approval of a new office manager. President Corona STATES THAT Deb Getty the current office manager will be leaving TEAM RCD to pursue other opportunities in her career. President Corona also stated that temporarily she has someone to do the typing etc for the time being but since there is no one permanent at the moment she asked to table the item and move to the next item.

Item 2: Discussion and Update on Arundo Removal partnership with Mission RCD.- President Corona reminded the Board of a partnership with Mission RCD using the Long Term Streambed Agreement in coordination with a grant they had where they needed to use the monies to finish off the grant requirements. They found a project in our area and with our supervision through James Law, the removal has been completed and TEAM RCD is just waiting for the final reports which will be included in the 2022 CDFW reports. Billing to Mission RCD will be forwarded once billing is received from SAWA.

Item 3: Update on MOU with Coachella Valley-President Corona reported that the MOU with Coachella Valley passed their Board and has been signed and delivered. The collaboration would be a backstop and help to Mission RCD if there were a time that Luis at Mission would need help in doing the water audits.

Item 4: Update on the Annual audit.-Director Parkes summarized the Annual Audit as follows. The audit is based on an end date of June 30 explaining that the auditors prepare an overview of the plan, scope and timing for the financial statement audits. He noted that they adhere to generally accepted accounting principles which includes discussions with management and bookkeeping. He said that the audit went well and the auditors encountered no disagreements or significant issues or difficulties in performing their audit and that no audit adjustments were noted or necessary. Director Parkes also said that the important information to note was that the net position of the District increased by \$116,613.00 during that year or an 8.66% increase. Also, the net position of the District increased to \$1.436 million over the year.

Director Biancardi ask if a large chunk of the income came from the existing Flood Control contract in which the response was yes however, President Corona pointed out that the District also gets quite a bit of funding from the AEIP, Crop Swap and Rootstock programs that are run in collaboration with the Rancho California Water District. President Corona also explained briefly the history of the Board prior and their finances prior to 2014 and what TEAM RCD had done going forward to be more transparent with the County in order to assure compliance and transparency with their books. President Corona also went on to explain how the Flood Control projects came about and, with input from AD Neugebauer explained how the District works on a "fee for service" basis.

Director Parkes added additional information regarding how profits and losses are reflected in the audit due to the fact that work on many of these projects are confined to specific times of year due to nesting season and CDFW restrictions therefore some months may look like a loss, but only because the work has not been billed or TEAM RCD did not receive revenue for that work in the month that it was done. Further, she explained that how the initial projects expanded for Flood Control and how many of the projects came under budget which allowed left over funds to be used again at existing sites to get some of the vegetation under control and it also which included bi-monthly monitory for homeless which is ongoing. This assists the community outreach and homeless task forces to be made aware of encampments and work toward moving and assisting those homeless prior to it expanding out of the control of the local law enforcement and community services.

Item 5-Discussion and potential discussion for hiring a new bookkeeping company-With the departure of the office manager, the President has found an affordable bookkeeping company called New Options which is an independent bookkeeping company owned by Rae Shirer keeping the existing rate that the former office manager was paid. After a motion by the President, and a second by Newt Parkes. Motion passed 4-1.

Item 5-Update on Greer Ranch/Adeline Farms/Benton Channel monitoring-AD Neugebauer reported that the year end bio-monitoring reports had been forwarded to CDFW and they are completed and done for the 2021 year. The report says that the water flow on Adeline Farms although pretty full in December there weren't any major problems out there with any of the conservation easements. President Corona added that Greer Ranch has quarterly monitoring and that work for those projects will be slated at a time that works around nesting season. This would include some invasive removal at Greer Ranch and that we plan to work with SAWA to do some habitat restoration in the Adeline Farms area. After giving a brief overview of a potential long term project that would use existing "urban slobber" from the outlets from the tract homes, President Corona said she would be reaching out to Army Corps for a potential meeting to see what can be achieved in this area.

Item 6-Update on yearly CDFW reporting-President Corona noted that all the appropriate reporting to CDFW for all projects for 2021 were submitted on time with the exception of the Arundo Removal which still had some work to be done in January. This work will be reported to CDFW on the 2022 reports. There was a small issue regarding an overpayment of \$360.00 but the agency is looking into it to see if reimbursement is applicable.

NEW BUSINESS

Item 1-Form 700 submittals-Outgoing office manager reminded the Board to submit their Form 700's by April 1. No motion necessary.

Item 2-Discussion on Potential Grant with Cal-Recycle for Anza/Aguanga/Area- Director Biancardi proceeded to inform the Board of a potential grant with Cal-Recycle called the Farm & Ranch Solid Waste Abatement Grant Program that she has been working with President Corona on. The program provides grant funds for removal of unauthorized solid waste disposal that has occurred on a farm or ranch parcel(s), property is in need of cleanup to abate a nuisance or public health and safety threat and/or a threat to the environment, Property is zoned or otherwise authorized for agricultural activities.

The grant possibility was brought to the attention of President Corona in late January when she was contacted by Stephanie Becker with Cal-Recycle who had been contacted by a citizen in our District who had her unauthorized waste left on her property which is located within the district. After phone calls with CalRecyle, AD Rick Neugebauer who checked the APN's, the owner of the property and contacting SAWA to do a site inspection, Ms. Corona arranged a phone call with Cal-Recycle, Director Biancardi, since this was her assigned area, Jeff Brandt from CDFW and James Law from SAWA to discuss the possibility of applying for the grant based on information gathered.

The timeline was very short (one week) and Director Biancardi along with James Law were asked to put together a budget for this project and Director Biancardi along with Director Corona would fill out all the applicable paperwork by Nov. 10 with the exception of a final motion to approve the grant application as submitted and the accompanying resolution which needed to be passed by this meeting. The budget was an estimate based on site inspection and SAWA would be using the California Conservation Corps to do some of the work. All paperwork was submitted to CalRecycle by November 9th in time to make the deadline with a written copy of the approved resolution to follow after the meeting.

President Corona asked Director Biancardi to make a motion to approve the grant submission and the resolution. Director Parkes seconded the motion. No further discussion. Unanimously approved 4-1.

Item 3-Update on increase in Liability Insurance- Director Parkes gave a report about the update on the increase in liability insurance from SDRMA. In 2021 we paid \$2650.00 roughly and this year's amount will be between \$3,052 to \$3244.00. AD Neugebauer asked what the limits were and Director Parkes said he didn't know but would find out. Director Parkes said that Errors and Omissions insurance was covered in this policy.

OLD BUSINESS

Item 1-Update on Temecula Elementary invasive removal project and Empire Creek Project-President Corona updated the Board about the progress of the invasive removal near Temecula Elementary. There is nothing to report at this point and TEAM is waiting for a response from CDFW to see if some of the limbing of the trees can go higher to allow law enforcement and the school to see within the channel that needs the vegetation removal. No motion necessary.

Item 2-Update on Clinton Keith Property and Rivers and Lands Conservancy-President Corona and AD Neugebauer hosted a phone call with RLC on January 22 to discuss further the possibilities of RLC obtaining the 75 acres from TEAM RCD. The meeting went well and RLC will be waiting for more information for a future discussion. President Corona explained the background to the Board on how the property was obtained and the outstanding issues that still need to be addressed. TEAM RCD is waiting for that information to be pulled from the CDFW archives at which point the former contact for CDFW, Jeff Brandt, will be discussing it with the current contact Heather Pert in order to get her up to speed on the history of this property in order to move forward. Nothing more to report until more information is obtained.

Item 3-Homeless Monitoring report-Director Parkes reported that there was not much new other that there have been 3-4 sites where homeless and transient activity seem to be consistently showing up. That would be Tucalota Creek 3, Santa Gertrudis Channel and the Temecula Creek AD 159. He noted

that although he consistently makes the task forces aware of the activity there does not seem to be much change in that TEAM RCD has no enforcement responsibilities. Director Parkes said that the Task Force headed by Mike Wooten they had taken some action but not all of the places but they are on the priority list. He suggested that we have the Mr. Wooten and the Task force attend one of our meetings and discuss their goals and mission at one of the meetings. President Corona asked Director Parkes to reach out as to a convenient time for them to attend.

Continued conversation included the good work that is going on in Lake Elsinore and "The Anchor" project there and Damien Fussel from Supervisor Jeffries office spoke on how the new redistricting may change how homelessness in Lake Elsinore is going to be addressed since two supervisors will be sharing that particular District.

Item 4-SAWA Report-AD Neugebauer noted that there was nothing to report, that it had been reasonably quiet with ongoing things that SAWA does with a lot of people working remotely. He indicated that Hames is probably the big force of nature that keeps all the projects going which reflects with the income revenue and profit stream. End of report.

At this time President Corona askes District Counsel how to allow Director Biancardi to do her report on Anza/Aguanga since Director Corona missed putting her report into the agenda. Director Biancardi said she had nothing to report but wanted to make a comment on the SAWA report. District Counsel commented that if Director Biancardi had nothing to report then that that would be fine but she could make a comment on one of the other items.

President Corona allowed Director Biancardi to make her comments. Director Biancardi was concerned about a pending item at SAWA regarding Category A Directors which had come up at a previous SAWA meeting at which she made a public comment requesting that there be no vote on the item until the TEAM RCD Board had a chance to review it. AD Neugebauer responded by outlining his authority given to him by the Board by majority vote to represent TEAM RCD and his capacity as President of the SAWA Board to put forth an agenda for the SAWA Board to continue forward with their business as a separate entity. After further exchanges, the Board then moved on to the next item on the agenda.

Item 5-Update on AIEP, Crop Swap Reports-Randy Feeney/Deb Getty- Director Feeney is taking over the Water Audit and Crop Swap programs that were formerly administrated by Director Lisa Battiato. Director Feeney reported that Deb Getty had had a short training time with him and he was just getting up to speed. Not a lot was going on right now but soon the Rancho Water District would be gearing up and doing their annual marketing and advertising to growers. No motion necessary

President Corona asks for a motion to adjourn. Director Parkes moves, Randy Feeney seconds. Unanimously approved 4-1. Meeting adjourned 5:01 p.m.





19 Supplemental Paid Sick Leave Law

On February 9, 2022, Governor Newsom signed Senate Bill ("SB") 114 into law. RQ Credit Incentive Deadline

If you have not yet submitted the 2022-23 Renewal Questionnaire, the *February 15, 2022 deadline* to earn the \$75 credit per program for submitting the Renewal Questionnaire (RQ) is fast approaching.

Your participation in providing updated, accurate and timely information will enable us to provide your agency with an **estimated renewal cost/indication** in late March. However, we will <u>not</u> be able to issue an indication to your agency if the RQ is not submitted by the **final March 1 deadline**. Failure to submit the RQ by March 1, 2022 will result in your agency being subject to a cap in coverage and penalty charge.

If your agency's RQ is completed and submitted electronically through MemberPlusTm by **February 15**, **2022**, a **\$75** credit will be applied on the Property/Liability and/or Workers' Compensation 2022-23 renewal invoice. RQ submissions received after February 15, 2022 will not receive the credit incentive.

Login to MemberPlus and click on the RENEWAL QUESTIONNAIRE drop down to access your agency's RQ. The final deadline to submit the 2022-23 RQ is March 1, 2022. You will not receive a hard copy RQ packet in the mail. Please contact us memberplus@sdrma.org or 800.537.7790 if you would like to request a hard copy RQ.

Important reminder: Also available in <u>MemberPlus</u>, under the QUICK LINKS dropdown you will find important information for your review, including <u>Important Dates</u> to remember, <u>Credit Incentive Program Criteria</u>, and your agency's <u>CIP Status Report</u>. The deadline to earn CIP credits for the 2022-23 program year is March 31, 2022.

Members considering withdrawal from the Property/Liability and/or the Workers' Compensation Program are required to submit a "Notice of Intent to Withdraw" according to the SDRMA Bylaws by April 1 or the notice will not be valid. This notice can be sent via email or mail, and can be rescinded up until June 1, 2022, giving your agency enough time to obtain quotes and consider options. We require the submission of the RQ by March 1, even if a Notice of Intent to Withdraw is submitted, so that we may provide your agency with an accurate renewal indication for your consideration. For questions about the SDRMA withdrawal policy, please contact our Chief Member Services Officer, Ellen Doughty at edoughty@sdrma.org.

Important Update - Cyber Liability

If your agency is a member of the SDRMA Property/Liability Program with Cyber Liability Coverage in effect, you should have seen information on the 2022-23 Cyber Liability Coverage renewal that would

require a separate renewal application through the Alliant Cyber Liability Portal.

We recently learned that our existing Property/Liability program members that currently have Cyber Liability Coverage are <u>not</u> required to complete this application for the upcoming renewal. However, we encourage you to review and complete the Alliant Cyber Liability Application in preparation for the 2023-24 renewal.

In the next few weeks, you should receive an email directly from Alliant, with a link to the Cyber Liability Application Portal. If you do not, please contact us at memberplus@sdrma.org to request the link be forwarded to you.

Not all SDRMA Property/Liability members currently have Cyber Liability Coverage. If you are unsure of your agency's coverage, please reference the Certificate of Coverage for clarification. You can view your agency's Certificate of Coverage through MemberPlus^{T,m} under the COVERAGE DOCUMENTS drop down.



Homeless Task Force

January 20, 2022 8:00 to 9:00 a.m.

1. Introductions

2. 2022 Task Force Objectives

- a. Brainstorm our top three priorities in the coming year.
- b. Topics of consideration could include exploring a regional solution to substance abuse and mental health challenges, areas of focus for street outreach e.g. Elm Grove Beach, expanding outreach capabilities, a new program or services, education and outreach targets, promoting incentives to landlords, securing funding or starting programs for at risk homeless, identifying needs for youth, or seeking new partnerships.
- c. Objective Ideas and Notes from Task Force:
 - i. Work to consistently house more individuals and utilize additional rooms at The Anchor. (Bridget Moore Wildomar)
 - Response from Aaron: SWAG operates a "needs-based" approach, which is a slow process. Sometimes the Outreach Team has to bring in an individual daily for showers and meals to allow them to get comfortable before they are willing to accept housing.
 - 2. This process was used with Richard to convince him to accept help. Mentioned that Richard might be at a housing facility in Perris now.
 - 3. Use those living at The Anchor to promote and encourage others.
 - ii. California has grown from 89,000 to 113,000 homeless individuals in the last few years. We need to evaluate if what we are doing is or isn't working, and if not, how do we change our approach? Why is this number growing? (Joseph Morabito Wildomar)
 - It's important to capture individuals experiencing different level of homelessness, including sheltered homeless individuals and those on the verge of experiencing homelessness.

iii. Housing Ideas:

- The Oxford House Compound in Kentucky, self-governed, self-supported recovery housing capturing people at multiple levels, with locations in 49 states, except for California.
- 2. Save the Need Foundation establishing a 60,000-person homeless village on 900 acres in Lancaster.



- a) Three hundred eight (308) or fewer fee parcels will be offered for a minimum bid of cost of sale only.
- b) One hundred thirty-five (135) or fewer fee parcels will be offered at a minimum bid of taxes only, plus cost of sale.
- c) Sixty-nine (69) or fewer fee parcels will be offered at a minimum bid of \$100.

In general, the financial impact of tax sales can be summarized as follows:

- Sales at, or above, the amount of taxes owed have no direct negative impact on the County's budget.
- For this sale, if all parcels being reoffered for cost of sale were to sell for only the
 minimum bid, the maximum tax loss would be \$4,641,199. Considering the
 Teeter formula, which shares this loss with other taxing entities, the maximum
 loss of the Tax Loss Reserve Fund would be \$3,073,046. Parcels reoffered for
 taxes only, plus cost of sale will not realize a tax loss.
- Accordingly, there should be no direct impact on the County General Fund because reserves exceeding the amount have been set aside.
- The Tax Collector has determined that parcels which are offered for a minimum bid of \$100 should stimulate interest through the online auction. All parcels in question have previously been offered for sale, most on multiple occasions, without garnering any bids. The \$100 minimum bid is purposefully set low, in order to generate interest. It is likely that final bids will far surpass the \$100 minimum.
- There will likely be minimal impact upon the Tax Loss Reserve Fund itself. Based upon recent experience, this sale is not expected to realize the maximum loss for three reasons: (1) properties are inevitably pulled from the sale due to various reasons including taxpayer redemptions; (2) some parcels will sell for more than the minimum bid; and (3) other parcels are likely to receive no bids. For example, in previous tax sales, the maximum loss to the Tax Loss Reserve Fund for 2019-2020 was \$2,640,703; however, the realized loss was \$499,824 only 19% of the maximum loss. Similarly, the maximum loss of the Tax Loss Reserve Fund for 2020-2021 was \$2,123,552; however, the realized loss was \$228,437 only 11% of the maximum loss.

Impact on Residents and Businesses

The purpose of offering tax-defaulted properties is to collect unpaid taxes and return the property to a revenue-generating status by conveying the property to another owner or motivating the assessee to redeem.

non-native plant control on a watershed scale. It is only at this level that non-native plants will be effectively removed from the riparian systems. If control is not carried out from the top of the watershed to the bottom, then upstream sources will re-infect areas downstream that have been cleared. The goal of this project is to bring together all stakeholders in the watersheds and to remove invasive non-native plants to restore the habitat for the native flora and fauna, to reduce the risk of fire and flooding damage, and to reduce the amount of non-native plant debris on the beaches. The beneficiaries of the project will include: the native flora and fauna due to restored native habitat, the communities within the watersheds due to improved recreational opportunities, and the cities, water districts and fire departments due to less damaging flood and fire events.

on the environment, restoring the native habitat. In southern California the removal of Arundo donax (a prevalent invasive non-native plant) has been used as mitigation for temporary and small permanent impacts to wetlands because it restores the native riparian habitat Furthermore, Section 15061 states that "Subsection (b)(3) provides a short way for agencies to deal with discretionary activities which could arguably be subject to the CEQA process but which common sense provides should not be subject to the Act." Non-native species are considered the second largest threat after habitat destruction to the environment in the United States. The non-native invasive plants in the riparian systems of southern California have taken over large areas, displacing the native flom and not providing the equivalent structure and function. Once these non-native plants are removed, the riparian systems are able to recover due to the regeneration of the system that naturally occurs after flooding. Section 15305, Article 19 states that Class 4 categorical exemptions "consist of minor public or private alterations in the condition of land, water, and/or vegetation which do not involve removal of healthy, mature, scenic trees except for forestry or agricultural purposes." This exotic plant control project involves the control of several target exotic plants, none of which are trees. The exotic plants are generally scattered, therefore it does not involved the removal of large areas of vegetation. The removal of the non-native plants will result in improvement of the habitat for fish and wildlife resources.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING ("MOU") AGREEMENT

Between:

Mission Resource Conservation District ("Mission RCD") and Temecula-Elsinore-Anza-Murrieta ("TEAM RCD")

This Agreement between the "Local Project Sponsor" (Mission RCD) and the "Partner" TEAM RCD sets forth the understanding between the Local Project Sponsor and the Partner (collectively "Parties") for work performed pursuant to an Agreement between the Wildlife Conservation Board ("WCB") Stream Flow Enhancement Program Prop 1 Grant and Mission RCD ("WCB Agreement").

Recitals

- As part of the work under the WCB Grant, Mission RCD has entered into an Agreement for "Invasive Non-native Plant Control of Arundo donax," Agreement No. 2017009 dated 2017-8-11.
- 2. This MOU Agreement is designed to reflect the agreement between Mission RCD ("Local Project Sponsor" under the WCB Agreement) and the "Partner" TEAM RCD, which holds regulatory permits and/or Right of Entry Agreements (ROEs) for work activities on the Santa Margarita Watershed in Riverside County. Regulatory permits held by Partner include a Streambed Alteration Agreement ("SAA," 1600-2012-0014-R6) issued by the California Dept. of Fish and Wildlife.
- 3. Project description: Invasive Non-native Plant Arundo donax (giant reed) Control in Support of the Prop 1 WCB Grant. Arundo control has the following benefits: water will be conserved by increasing available groundwater; flood risk and damage will be reduced; fire risk will be reduced; and water quality will be enhanced by reducing erosion through minimizing bank failures and normalizing geomorphic processes. Several federal and state listed endangered species will benefit from the habitat enhancement that this project generates as wetland function is restored.

The Recitals are incorporated herein and, the Parties agree as follows:

A. Agreement

This MOU Agreement is made and entered into on the latter of the dates written below until terminated by any of the Parties with thirty (30) days' written notice to the other Parties.

B. Duties of the Parties

- Each of the Parties shall be responsible for and undertake the following Project activities:
 - a) Mission RCD shall:
 - Complete any and all contracting necessary for the Project.
 - Prepare and select contractors to be used for Project activities, including preparation of any contracting documents, including but not limited to Requests for Qualifications/Requests for Proposals.
 - · Prepare invoices to be sent to WCB.
 - Prepare any and all reports required by WCB.
 - Comply with all permit conditions contained in the Partner's Santa Margarita and San Luis Rey Watersheds Invasive Species Control Program as described and authorized in the project California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) document(s), and the SAA issued by the California Dept. of Fish and Wildlife.
 - Provide adequate documentation of project implementation (including photographic documentation, maps, and written description of work completed) to Partner for reporting purposes required of Partner in accordance with Partner's regulatory permits. A report will be prepared for TEAM RCD with maps, photos, and work description that will be reviewed by TEAM RCD. This report will be used to fulfil permit reporting requirements under TEAM RCD's SAA.
 - In the event of a Permit violation, take all corrective actions required by the Partner or regulatory agency responsible for the permit.
 - Save, indemnify and hold harmless TEAM MRCD against any liability, loss, cost, damage
 and expense caused by or arising from the exercise of the rights granted herein and/or
 any act(s) or omission(s) of Mission RCD, its employees, agents, contractors, and
 volunteers, successors and assigns; including, but not limited to any such loss, cost,
 damage, liability and expense arising from damage to or destruction of real and
 personal property or injury to or death of any person; provided, however, that Nature
 Collective's duty to indemnify and hold harmless shall not include any claims or liability
 arising from the established sole negligence or willful misconduct of the Mission RCD, its
 agents, officers, or employees.
 - b) The Partner shall:

- Send quarterly invoices representing work conducted by the Partner: typically related to coordination, any ROE work, and permit reporting and monitoring.
- Work with Mission RCD to assure efficient work and permit compliance for all Project activities.

C. <u>Description of Payment for Services</u>

- 1) Under the WCB Agreement, Mission RCD shall submit invoices for Project work to WCB. To comply with this submission requirement, the Partner shall submit any invoices for its own work to Mission RCD within two (2) weeks of a request for invoicing. All submitted invoices will include, at a minimum, the following information:
 - Costs incurred by the Partner for work performed in implementing the Project (only Partner staff time, and SAWA time for review and assistance, may be billed).
 - Appropriate reports for costs incurred, in a format approved by Mission RCD (such as any SAA fees).
 - Partner costs will not exceed \$5,000 unless authorized by the Mission RCD.
- 2) The Parties agree that the following conditions or costs, even if expended in conjunction with the Project, are not reimbursable with WCB Agreement funds. These costs include, but are not limited to:
 - Purchase of equipment.
 - Travel and per diem costs. Travel includes the cost of transportation subsistence, and other associated costs incurred by Party personnel.
- The Partner shall comply with all applicable terms and conditions of the WCB Agreement.
- 4) Following the review of each invoice submitted by Mission RCD to WCB, WCB is to disburse to Mission RCD the approved amount. All funds disbursed by WCB shall be used solely to pay eligible costs. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of funds from WCB, Mission RCD shall disburse funds due and owing to the Partner.
- 5) The Parties acknowledge that, pursuant to the WCB Agreement, WCB will withhold as retention ten percent (10%) of the defined "Eligible Costs." This amount will be withheld until completion of the Contract and submission of required reports. As a result, the Parties understand that there will be a delay in receiving all contract funding due and owing to the Parties until the WCB Agreement is closed with WCB and retention is released.

D. Accounting and Deposit of Contract Disbursement

- The Partner agrees that it shall: 1) maintain audit and accounting procedures that are in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and practices; and 2) keep complete and accurate records of all disbursements.
- 2) Records are subject to inspection by WCB at all reasonable times. The Partner's fiscal control and accounting procedures must be sufficient to permit tracing of grant funds to a level of expenditure adequate to establish that such funds have not been used in violation of state and local laws, this MOU, or the WCB/Mission RCD Agreement.

E. Description of Communication

Any notice, demand, request, consent, or approval that any party desires or is requested to give to the other party shall be in writing. Notices may be sent by mail, courier, electronic mail or any other means of delivery. Any party may, by written notice to the others, designate a different address that shall be substituted for the one below:

Farm and Ranch Solid Waste Cleanup and Abatement Grant Program

What is the Farm and Ranch Grant Program?

The Farm and Ranch Solid Waste Cleanup and Abatement Grant Program provides funding from the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) for the cleanup of illegal solid waste sites on farm or ranch property.

Grants are limited to \$50,000 per cleanup or abatement project, with a limit of \$200,000 per year for each eligible applicant.

What is Farm or Ranch Property?

Farm or ranch property is property that is used for rangeland or agricultural activities such as, but not limited to, commercial livestock and crop production, horticulture, aquaculture, silviculture, floriculture, vermiculture, and viticulture. Farm or ranch property can be publicly or privately owned and need not have active sales or production, but must be appropriately zoned or otherwise authorized for agricultural activities.

Who Is Eligible to Apply for the Grant?

Only cities, counties, resource conservation districts, and federally recognized Native American tribes may apply. Property owners who desire grant funding to clean up their

property must work with one of the entities listed above. See the "Need More Information?" section for contact information.

What Sites Are Eligible for Grants?

Sites may be eligible for grant funding if the property meets all of the following criteria:

- Unauthorized solid waste disposal has occurred on a farm or ranch parcel(s).
- Property is in need of cleanup to abate a nuisance or public health and safety threat and/or a threat to the environment.
- The owner is not responsible for the illegally disposed waste.
- Property is zoned or otherwise authorized for agricultural activities.

What Cleanup Activities May This Grant Money be Used For?

Eligible expenses include, but are not limited to:

- Waste removal and disposal
- Recycling
- Personnel to administer the grant
- Drainage control and grading improvement
- Slope and foundation stabilization
- Equipment rental
- Excavation
- Revegetation
- Site security
- Public education
- Removal of chlorofluorocarbons (CFC)
- Administrative costs up to 7 percent of the cleanup costs expended

Can a Property Owner Get Reimbursed for a Previous Cleanup?

Yes. Reimbursement of costs previously incurred by a farm or ranch property owner for cleanup or abatement of an illegal solid waste site is allowed. However, verification and

documentation must be provided to clearly show that:

- Eligibility criteria have been met (see "What sites are eligible for grants?").
- Costs incurred were used specifically for the cleanup or abatement work.

Whenever possible, property owners should coordinate with one of the eligible grant recipients prior to cleanup.

How do I get a Grant Application?

The Application is now online in CalRecycle's web-based Grants Management System (GMS). There are three grant cycles each year.

Other CalRecycle Grants for Illegal Dumping

Local Government Waste Tire Cleanup Grants and Waste Tire Amnesty Grants

These are grants available to local government entities (including local enforcement agencies [LEA]), county and city departments, special districts and California Native American organizations. Grants are awarded on a competitive basis for the removal, transportation, recycling, and disposal of waste tires from illegal tire piles and areas where illegal dumping has occurred along public rights-of-way. The Tire Amnesty Grant Program funds amnesty events for the public to bring in their tires to convenient locations at no charge.

Solid Waste Disposal Site Cleanup Grants

These are competitive grants available to public entities. These grants can finance remediation projects at solid waste disposal sites where there is a threat to public health and safety or the environment, and where the responsible party is unable or unwilling to perform the timely remediation or is unidentified.






