And for those who joined yesterday's recap meeting, I'm also happy to admit I was wrong in my thinking that the Governor would veto this bill.

- 1) Adds RCDs to the list of entities eligible for late payment penalties under the Prompt Payment Act, as specified.
- 2) Adds restoration activities performed by an RCD to existing grant-funded victim services and prevention programs administered by the state.
- 3) Adds RCDs to the exempted entities regarding the existing automatic 30 calendar day extension of contracts with Cal FIRE that would become subject to late payment penalties during the annually declared fire season, as specified.
- 4) Adds RCDs the list of exempted entities regarding the suspension of late payment penalties due to a major calamity, disaster, or criminal act, as specified.




Bathroom Bill and Federal Infrastructure Funding Mandate Among Measures Held Under Submission Last

CSDA Releases Mid-Year Legislative Report as Legislature Returns for Final Push

The California State Legislature reconvened from its summer recess this week to complete its work on hundreds of pending bills before August 31. Governor Gavin Newsom will then have one month to sign or veto any legislation arriving on his desk at the conclusion of the legislative session. Download <u>CSDA's Mid-Year Legislative Report</u> for an in-depth look on the status of CSDA-priority legislation at this key juncture in the legislative process. CSDA - with the help of our special district members - successfully advocated on numerous bills in connection with their house of origin deadline. A number of CSDA budgetary priorities were also included in the signed 2022-23 California State Budget. The Legislature reconvened on August 1 with the first legislative deadline being August 12 for fiscal committees to meet and report on bills, and for bills to be removed from the committee's suspense file. From August 15-31, there will be no policy committee meetings, only Assembly and Senate floor sessions, with August 25 being the last day to amend bills

August 31 is the last day for each house to pass legislation. CSDA is already communicating with the Governor's office to advocate on legislation heading toward passage. September 30 will be the last day for Governor Gavin Newsom to sign or veto bills that have reached his desk.

CSDA will continue to work diligently on behalf of all special districts, throughout the last remaining weeks of the legislative year. For all the latest advocacy updates, be sure to subscribe to CSDA's Advocacy News community.

Proponents Submit 1.4 Million Signatures to Qualify Initiative Limiting Ability of Voters and State and Local Governments

Proponents of Initiative #21-0042A1 submitted 1,429,529 signatures by the August 2 deadline to qualify the constitutional amendment for voter consideration. Should county elections officials confirm the validity of at least 997,139 signatures, the initiative to limit the ability of voters and state and local governments to raise revenues for government services will be placed on the November 2024 statewide ballot. CSDA is calling on all special districts to join the more than 150 local governments that have already passed resolutions in opposition to the costly measure.

The purported "Taxpayer Protection and Government Accountability Act," sponsored by the California Business Roundtable ("CBRT"), is the most consequential proposal to limit the ability of the state and local governments to enact, modify, or expand taxes, assessments, fees, and property-related charges since the passage of Proposition 218 (1996) and Proposition 26 (2010). If enacted, public agencies would face a drastic rise in litigation that could severely restrict their ability to meet essential services and infrastructure needs.

County elections officials are in the process of conducting a random sample verification of the 1.4 million signatures submitted by proponents. They have 38 working days from the submission of signatures to confirm whether the random sample process yields a sufficient number of valid signatures. If the random sample verifies 110 percent of required signatures, then the initiative qualifies automatically. If it yields less than 95 percent of necessary valid signatures, then it fails. If it yields less than 110 percent, but greater than 95 percent, then elections officials receive another 30 working days to conduct a full check of all signatures. Interested parties can track the results of the ongoing count on the website of the California Secretary of State.

CSDA has joined a coalition of local government leaders in adopting an "Oppose" position on Initiative 21-0042A1 and encourages all special districts, partners, and community leaders to join the coalition.







Governor Newsom Vetoes Costly Website Mandate and Signs Brown Act Legislation **Among Hundreds of Actions** Prior to Deadline



A state of bills amending the Brown Act open meetings law and supported by CSDA were among the hundreds of bills signed by Governor Gavin Newsom in the final days and hours prior to the September 30 deadline. One vetoed bill included yet another website mandate that was opposed by CSDA. Of the 101 bills opposed by CSDA during the 2021-2022 State Legislative Session, only 23 became law; 78 bills were killed or amended to remove concerns. 9 of which were vetoed by the Governor. Of the 123 bills supported by CSDA, 69 were signed into law. READ MORE



On September 9, 2022, EPA released its 60-day Notice of Proposed Rulemaking designating the two most studied and most widely used PFAS – perfluorocctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorocctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) – as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act, commonly referred to as the "Superfund Law," which is an EPA program to respond to environmental contamination to protect public health as well as the environment.

Comments are due November 7, 2022.



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



BREAKING DOWN THE CONSERVATION INVESTMENTS IN INFLATION REDUCTION ACT

On Friday, August 12, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (IRA). Earlier that week, the U.S. Senate passed the IRA by a vote of 51-50. NACD applauded the bill's inclusion of historic investments to support conservation, improve resilience, and address climate change. The IRA is currently set to be signed into law by President Biden later this afternoon.

"NACD is pleased to see continued support from Congress and the administration in conservation program funding," said NACD President Michael Crowder. "We applaud this investment in conservation and natural resource management, and we will continue to advocate for support for these programs that are critical to addressing climate change by improving the health of our soils, watersheds, and forests. We look forward to continuing our work with all members of Congress, on both sides of the aisle, to bring voluntary conservation and natural resource management to the producers and landowners who benefit from these programs."

The IRA includes approximately \$18 billion for voluntary conservation programs administered by the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) between Fiscal Years 2023 and 2026. The bill also prioritizes funding for projects supported by these programs that reduce, capture, or prevent greenhouse gas emissions. The IRA also includes \$1 billion for conservation technical assistance, which allows NRCS and conservation districts across the country to help producers and land managers assess resources needs, develop conservation plans, and implement conservation practices.

"This funding represents a great opportunity for conservation districts and their partners to bring natural resource management efforts into practice," said NACD CEO Jeremy Peters. "Conservation districts are invaluable to the delivery of these programs and their benefits to communities across the country."

NACD is excited to begin working with our agency partners and members to help districts use this funding to support on-the-ground conservation in communities across the country. In the coming weeks, NACD's Government Affairs team will be releasing a series of blog posts detailing the conservation provisions in the IRA and sharing opportunities for districts engage. 

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

NACD: NACD Announces \$15 Million in 2022 Technical Assistance Grants

Today, the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) announced the award of \$15 million in new technical assistance grants as continued funding to nearly 500 conservation districts in 49 states and territories. This program allows NACD to accelerate on-the-ground conservation by increasing the capacity available to conduct outreach and deliver technical assistance to farmers, ranchers and forest stewards across the U.S.

NASDA: State Departments of Agriculture Offer Educational Opportunities for Farmers to Proactively Adopt Food Safety Measures on the Farm By Sara Grace Fowler 08/10/22

Through state produce safety programs that are cooperating with FDA to implement the Produce Safety Rule, farmers are offered a free, voluntary and confidential educational opportunity to invite a team of these state specialists to teach them how to meet the food safety standards required by the Food Safety Modernization Act's Produce Safety Rule.

USDA: USDA Investing \$197 Million in Partner-Driven, Locally-Led Conservation **08/12/22**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced it is awarding \$197 million for 41 locally led conservation projects through the Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP). RCPP is a partner-driven program that leverages partner resources to advance innovative projects that address climate change, enhance water quality, and address other critical challenges on agricultural land.

Agri-Pulse: Historic Funding Bill for Addressing Climate Change Clears Congress By Philip Brasher 08/12/22

(Subscriber only) The Agriculture Department is poised to pour nearly \$20 billion into expanding climate-related farming practices under a historic funding package the House cleared Friday. The bill would provide \$18 billion for four farm bill conservation programs, plus another \$1.4 billion for the Natural Resources Conservation Service to provide technical assistance to farmers and measure the impact of farming practices on carbon emissions.

New funding will bolster the steps that USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) announced to improve opportunities for nutrient management. NRCS will target funding, increasing program flexibilities, launch a new outreach campaign to promote nutrient management's economic benefits, in addition to expanding partnerships to develop nutrient management plans.

Hay & Forage Grower: There's a Plethora of Winter Grazing Options By Amber Friedrichsen 08/16/22

While cold weather might not be top of mind, it is time to think about winter feeding strategies and inventory. Preplanning to maximize utilization rates and extend the grazing season could help to combat current high feed costs and fuel prices. Depending on location, producers have many options for winter feeding. With proper planning, winter grazing can even be successful in regions with cold and snowy conditions.


Agri-Pulse: New AFBF Survey Captures Drought Impacts on Farms 08/17/22

(Subscriber only) Farmers and ranchers across the West and Plains states continue to be hammered by the drought. A new survey by the American Farm Bureau Federation captures the far-reaching implications on farmers' and ranchers' bottom lines, but also food availability and affordability. The survey included more than 600 responses from county and state Farm Bureau leaders, staff and members in 15 states from Texas to North Dakota to California.

USDA: USDA Announces First Three Lenders for Heirs' Property Relending Program 08/18/22

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced that Akiptan, Inc., the Cherokee Nation Economic Development Trust Authority (CNEDTA) and the Shared Capital Cooperative have been approved or conditionally approved

as intermediary lenders through the Heirs' Property Relending Program (HPRP). Once HPRP loans with these lenders close, these lenders will help agricultural producers and landowners resolve heirs' land ownership and succession issues.



Maine Public: As Climate Change Alters Maine Farms, Ag Allies Aims to Protect Bobolinks and Other Grassland Birds By Murray Carpenter | Maine | Northeast Region 07/27/22

Ag Allies, with the Somerset County Soil and Water Conservation District, offers incentive payments to some farmers to compensate for any loss in hay quality due to a delayed harvest, which is encouraged to allow ground-nesting birds time to leave their nests. The program has grown from just 2 farms in 2016, to more than 50 this year, and 1,100 acres. Of those, about half take incentive payments, while others just want guidance about protecting birds.

Des Moines Register: Iowa Drought Growing Worse, Cutting into the State's Projected Soybean Harvest

The drought in Iowa is deepening and expanding, potentially cutting into Iowa's soybean harvest this fall. Iowa's soybean harvest is forecast to fall 4.7% this year over 2021, a U.S. Department of Agriculture crop report shows. Average soybean yields are forecast to drop to 58 bushels per acre this year from 62 in 2021, a new report shows.



Baxter in Georgetown, Delaware. Baxter is a fourth-generation farmer and works with the Sussex Conservation District for conservation planning and best management practices. Baxter Farms is a 2,000+ acre farming operation growing com, soybeans, wheat, and lima beans. The farm utilizes many species of cover crops, including legumes and grasses. The field day gathered district and agency staff, producers, and other local stakeholders to hear from numerous presenters on conservation in action both locally and across the country. NACD Communications Specialist Mariah MacKenzie attended the field day. The event served as an opportunity for attendees to learn about the principles of soil health and see firsthand the impacts that soil health practices have on the field.



What prompted Skagit County to draft the initial CWPP document? The original CWPP was drafted in 2009 by the Skagit Conservation District and was a supplement to the NHMP being updated. At the time of the NHMP update process, the Conservation District had received Title III funds from Skagit County to support Firewise USA Program efforts and a wildfire risk reduction coordinator (me). We also had a veteran Forester on staff who was well informed on the NHMP update process. Recognizing that we were in a good position to provide guidance on the wildfire section of the NHMP plan, we started attending update meetings and offering our services. From there, we recognized that we should have a stand-alone CWPP that accompanied the NHMP that could address more specifics. We had the staff and the funding to develop the CWPP, so we did!

When did Skagit County decide to revise the CWPP?


The CD did an accomplishments update to the CWPP around 2012, but it wasn't until 2019 – 10 years later – that we decided to do a complete revision of the CWPP as part of the NHMP update process. The main impetus for this was that our forester had been working for a couple of years on a new analysis method for wildfire risk that he wanted to use in a new CWPP. He had years of local knowledge and experience around wildfire occurrences, expertise in forest health, and connections to scientists through which he could vet his process. We were also trying to follow the best practices for incorporating the CWPP into the NHMP update process and document recommended by FEMA and connections through the various fire-adapted communities learning networks (WAFAC and FACNET) I was/am involved in.

What helped you reach your goal of revising the CWPP?

- We already had funding in place to support our work.
- We were already a trusted resource for the county with strong partnerships with other entities.
- We had a very knowledgeable person on staff with the right science background and experience to provide the core information for the CWPP.
- We had staff well-connected to the latest and greatest resources on CWPP development.



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
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USDA: USDA Boosts Conservation on Grazing Lands and Support for Farmers and Ranchers 08/08/22

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is investing up to \$12 million in partnerships that expand access to conservation technical assistance for livestock producers and increase the use of conservation practices on grazing lands. USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is accepting proposals through its Grazing Lands Conservation Initiative (GLCI) until September 22, 2022.

USDA: USDA to Invest \$15 Million in Innovative Projects for Climate-Smart Agriculture, Urban Agriculture and Addressing Invasive Species **08/10/22**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced it will invest \$15 million this year for the Conservation Innovation Grants (CIG) Classic program. Through CIG, grantees work to address our nation's water quality, water quantity, air quality, soil health and wildlife habitat challenges, all while supporting agricultural production.




NACD Attends SWCS Annual Meeting



NACD participated in the Soil and Water Conservation Society (SWCS) annual meeting last week in Denver, CO. The theme this year was "Elevating Conservation to New Heights".

Many breakout and general sessions covered topics of interest to Conservation Districts and NACD Leaders, Staff, as well as our Committees. There were numerous individual studies and reports on conservation success stories. NACD's exhibit booth was visited by a number of existing and new partners. NACD has a long standing strong partnership with the SWCS and has additional work together ahead including collecting and sending a joint delegation to the one water summit in WI next month.

STRONG PARTNERSHIPS IN KANSAS SERVE VETERANS



On Friday, August 5, the Kansas Association of Conservation Districts (KACD) hosted a field day with the Servicemember Agricultural Vocation Education (SAVE) Farm in Riley County, KS, and the Kansas chapter of the Land Improvement Contractors of America (KLICA).

The SAVE farm began in 2015 as a center for transitioning service members to heal and learn through agricultural education. Through the program, SAVE offers its student with a science knowledge and hands on experience that leaves them with long-term agricultural skills and an an understanding of the importance of producing in an ecologically and economically sustainable way.

This mission fits well with conservation districts and NRCS. SAVE has been involved with both groups from the beginning to accomplish improvement work on the farm as well as to provide learning opportunities to their students.

This field day showcased the planning work of NRCS as well as the field improvement work done by KLICA. Students from Kansas and Oklahoma came out to see the organizations and the work they have accomplished so far. Staff from the **Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts** were also present, and are working with SAVE and KACD to use as examples for their CARES project in Oklahoma.

This shining example shows how conservation districts can leverage partnerships to promote conservation agriculture to benefit multiple stakeholders at the local and state level.



Like many conservation districts, Valencia Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) a 2020 grantee through the joint NACD-NRCS Urban Agriculture Conservation grant initiative, faced many challenges managing the COVID-19 pandemic. However, the district continued making progress at two community garden sites that comprise the East Valencia Urban Gardens Program (EVUGP), thanks in part to their UAC grant.

In a year of transition for EVUGP, the community gardens did well this year thanks in large measure to the heavy lifting of the two garden managers - Ms. Cervantes and Ms. Jimenez - both members of an underserved community within eastern Valencia County. During a recent campaign for re-election to the district board, **Dr. Teresa Smith de Cherif**, Valencia SWCD Vice Chair and one of the individuals responsible for spearheading the garden, **said** "Scores of people in El Cerro Mission, Monterrey Park, and Meadow Lake told me that the gardens have given people joy and a sense of pride in their own work and in their community."

In 2021 the garden's youth interns continued to help the two garden managers plant, water, weed, mulch, and distribute the garden's abundant healthy produce. To do a better service to the garden managers and the youth interns, educational pamphlets were given to the garden workers every week, focusing on topics like soil health, gardening in New Mexico, perma-culturing, and use of beneficial insects and spiders.



As Valencia SWCD looks forward to the future for the gardens, the district continue to partner with community members and one important partner Youth Development Inc. (YDI). After several efforts to secure funds for the longterm management of the through county and USDA, the two partners were able to successfully apply for a State of New Mexico Next Generation grant in 2021, which is geared toward educational opportunities within the

The district is very excited to take next steps to ensure the continuation of the EVUGP gardens. Throughout 2022, they will lead several educational events, including healthy soils field days. For these events, they will invite people from other community gardens and a list of small organic farmers to come to the gardens and use a sheet mulching technique to reduce weeds (e.g., infestation of goat heads), safe water and improve soil organic materials. This will also be a chance to enlist local farmers and gardeners to join EVUGP as partners.

Valencia SWCD will also continue providing maintenance at the gardens, with plans to replace the drip irrigation system as needed, repair the hoop houses, and prepare seedlings for in-ground plantings. According to Dr. Smith de Cherif, such management of the gardens has helped program participants and other volunteers have learned soil and water conservation techniques and produced some 2,500 pounds of vegetables each year over the last few seasons. "I believe these gardens are vital to the health, wellbeing, and future of our communities," said Dr. Smith de Cherif.

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



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
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FRIENDS OF NACD GRANT SUPPORTS VALENCIA SWCD FARM TO TABLE CAMP



UPPER ELK CREEK DAM IN OKLAHOMA REDEDICATED



On August 24, 2022, conservation partners were brought together for the rededication of the Upper Elk Creek Dam 23D near Elk City, OK. Among the officials participating in the service and site visit included U.S. Congressman Frank Lucas, Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Chief Terry Cosby, Oklahoma Conservation Commission Executive Director Trey Lam, NRCS State Conservationist Gary O'Neill, NRCS Oklahoma State Conservation Engineer Chris Stoner, newly elected State Representative Nick Archer and Watershed project sponsor, North Fork of Red River Conservation District. NACD Director of Education Keith Owen and NACD South Central Region Representative Wesley Gibson were also present to represent NACD and support the re-dedication.

Constructed in 1976 at a cost of \$102,401 and classified as a significant hazard dam, the Upper Elk Creek Damn is now a high hazard dam. An increase in risk of loss of life and property damage due to a potential breach of the dam during an extreme flood event is the reason site 23D has recently undergone this rehabilitation. This flood control dam is located east of Elk City, OK and provides an estimated \$1 million dollars per year of benefit for downstream farms, homes, and infrastructure. Highway 40 runs downstream of the structure and is traveled by nearly 14,000 people per day. If not for the maintenance of this structure that infrastructure would be at risk.

"The thing we do today is we complete a commitment to extend the life of these important structures, not just by 50 years, the initial plan, but I personally believe with the change in the materials we are using, the design technology adjustments the upstream sediment control programs that we use in many places, these structures should last a century," said Congressman Lucas.

Oklahoma has 2,107 flood control structures, the most of any state in the nation, that enumerate to about \$2 billion in infrastructure. A structure like Upper Elk Creek Dam costs about \$4 million to rehab but contributes to a combined benefit of \$96 million yearly from these structures across the state. These flood control structures protect 2,756 bridges, reduce flooding of 41,744 farms and ranches, trap 19 million tons of sediment each year, and enhance 90,979 acres of wetlands, as well as water for livestock, irrigation, and wildlife habitat. Of the 2,107 structures in the state, 42 of them are multipurpose, meaning they provide municipal and rural water supplies and recreational areas for local communities.

OACD Auxiliary Scholarship Awarded Jeff Rice is a Soil Health Champion from Utica, KY. After graduating from Western Kentucky University, Rice worked at a variety of agribusinesses such as manager and certified crop advisor for USS Agrichem, ICI Americas, and Miles Farm Supply/Big Rivers Ag Companies. But in 2010, Rice began his family business Rice Agri-Marketing which serves Kentucky, Indiana, and Tennessee growers. Rice Agri-Marketing sells NuTech/Stewart/Partners brands of corn, beans, wheat, canola, and cover crop seed; is a Premier Precision Planting Dealer; and offers processor marketing and production/genetics research plots and recommendations.



Rice isn't just a businessman, he's also a farmer. He and his wife farm 518 acres of mostly row crops which include corn, soybeans, wheat, and canola. Rice has always been passionate about agriculture and caring for the land, so when he first bought his farm in the late 1980s, he quickly realized he needed to make conservation a priority or the land, water and other natural resources wouldn't be around for future generations.

From the beginning, Rice's operation was 100 percent no-till, but he employs additional conservation practices in his operation such as cover crops, grass waterways, filter strips, water drop structures, and more. The addition of these practices have helped Rice to see higher organic matter in



his soil, better drainage in his soil, higher yields, and greater profits. Rice says it's also a bonus that these practices have saved him time, cut his expenses, enhanced wildlife habitat on his operation and improved the farm's long-term sustainability.

At the encouragement of his father and other conservation leaders, Rice became involved with his local conservation district and NACD. To date, he has served as vice president and president of the Kentucky Association of Conservation Districts (KACD), the NACD board member for Kentucky, and currently serves on the Davless County Conservation District Board – advocating for locally-led conservation at all levels.

Over the final week of August, the leaders of NACD's Northeast Region gathered in idyllic Eastern Shore, Maryland for a week of capacity building, networking, and learning. The region meeting was hosted by the Maryland Association of Soil Conservation Districts and offered a robust agenda driven by topics of interest to partners, the Maryland districts, and the Northeast Region. This year's theme was "Strength Through Connection" which was seen throughout the varied and highly valuable sessions. The goal of this joint meeting was to build and strengthen the networks between conservation districts, state and federal agencies, farmers, private industry, nonprofits, and research institutions throughout the Northeast.

Attendees were joined by a strong showing of partners including Resource Conservation & Development (RC&D) Councils, National Conservation District Employees Association (NCDEA), Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), NACD and conservation districts, among others. Having so many groups together was a powerful reminder of the value of partnership and the underlying goals of the region meeting - working towards enhancing our strength through connections. During the meeting attendees had the opportunity to visit the Blackwater Refuge and learn about the impact of climate change and sea level rise as well as to view the "ghost forests" that highlight where saltwater has begun to intrude and kill off standing trees. Another tour visited several farms to learn about how conservation looks on land and in the water which included a trip to an Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) project that restored oyster beds and a beef operation focused on local markets.

The week was closed out with a Northeast Region Capacity Building session designed and led by Laura Meyer of KR Creatives. This session was the second in a series following a listening session Meyer led for the Northeast region leaders at NACD's 2022 summer meeting in San Juan, Puerto Rico. This capacity building effort is a continuation of this work initially started in 2018. This chapter of capacity building aims to reprioritize what is most needed at the regional level for this effort to be successful with an eye towards sustainability and making sure participants have the space and support they need to be able to engage while meeting their external priorities back at home or on the farm. Following the session, the group helped outline "bite sized" approaches on key items and a timeline to continue moving this group's energy and enthusiasm towards measurable outcomes.

Back to School with NACD Education Materials



NACD's Stewardship efforts give conservation districts the opportunity to extend the reach of their education programs and educate future leaders on the significance of natural resource conservation.

The 2023 theme of "One Water" raises awareness on the importance of our interconnectedness through our watersheds.

NACD's Annual Stewardship Week, hosted next year from April 30-May 7, 2023, is one of the largest national programs to promote natural resource conservation. Celebrated annually since 1955, NACD Stewardship Week reminds us of our



On August 24, 2022, conservation partners were brought together for the rededication of the Upper Elk Creek Dam 23D near Elk City, OK. Among the officials participating in the service and site visit included U.S. Congressman Frank Lucas, Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Chief Terry Cosby, Oklahoma Conservation Commission Executive Director Trey Lam, NRCS State Conservationist Gary O'Neill, NRCS Oklahoma State Conservation Engineer Chris Stoner, newly elected State Representative Nick Archer and Watershed project sponsor, North Fork of Red River Conservation District. NACD Director of Education Keith Owen and NACD South Central Region Representative Wesley Gibson were also present to represent NACD and support the re-dedication.

Constructed in 1976 at a cost of \$102,401 and classified as a significant hazard dam, the Upper Elk Creek Damn is now a high hazard dam. An increase in risk of loss of life and property damage due to a potential breach of the dam during an extreme flood event is the reason site 23D has recently undergone this rehabilitation. This flood control dam is located east of Elk City, OK and provides an estimated \$1 million dollars per year of benefit for downstream farms, homes, and infrastructure. Highway 40 runs downstream of the structure and is traveled by nearly 14,000 people per day. If not for the maintenance of this structure that infrastructure would be at risk.

"The thing we do today is we complete a commitment to extend the life of these important structures, not just by 50 years, the initial plan, but I personally believe with the change in the materials we are using, the design technology adjustments the upstream sediment control programs that we use in many places, these structures should last a century," said Congressman Lucas.

Oklahoma has 2,107 flood control structures, the most of any state in the nation, that enumerate to about \$2 billion in infrastructure. A structure like Upper Elk Creek Dam costs about \$4 million to rehab but contributes to a combined benefit of \$96 million yearly from these structures across the state. These flood control structures protect 2,756 bridges, reduce flooding of 41,744 farms and ranches, trap 19 million tons of sediment each year, and enhance 90,979 acres of wetlands, as well as water for livestock, irrigation, and wildlife habitat. Of the 2,107 structures in the state, 42 of them are multipurpose, meaning they provide municipal and rural water supplies and recreational areas for local communities.



As was the case for many of the successful applicants to the 2020 Urban Agriculture Conservation grant initiative offered in partnership by NACD and NRCS, the **Boone County Soil and Water Conservation District** (BCSWCD) faced many challenges during their grant period.

Soil Health PSA Nominated for Emmy Award



A television public service ad campaign series, rooted in South Dakota's healthy soil, has been nominated for an Upper Midwest Emmy Award by the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, announced the South Dakota
Association of Conservation Districts (SDACD).

The "Where Good Things Grow" TV PSA campaign is designed to educate consumers about our living and life-giving soil. It also highlights the ongoing work of a new generation of South Dakota farmers and ranchers who are breathing new life into this critical environmental and economic resource by farming in ways that protect the soil ecosystem and promote biodiversity above and below ground. It is produced by SDACD. assisted by a Cooperative Conservation Grant from USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service in South Dakota.

"We're obviously honored the spots have been nominated for the regional Emmy award and we're also very thankful that three key South Dakota television stations have helped us get the word out about the critical role soil health plays in the quality of South Dakotans' lives, environment and futures," said SDACD Executive Director Angela Ehlers.

The district received their UAC grant in March of 2020 to hire an Urban Ag Specialist to conduct outreach and provide technical assistance to small, urban and suburban producers in central Missouri. Filling the specialist position early in the pandemic proved challenging, and the pandemic further limited BCSWCD's ability to meet with producers or conduct outreach activities. The district quickly learned how to rely on virtual tools to get their work done however, using Facebook as a cost-effective avenue to advertise the position, which also allowed district staff to quickly review candidates.



Once hired, the urban ag specialist quickly began reaching out to partners and other organizations to familiarize themself with their programs, offerings, staff, and constituents. This allowed the specialist and other district staff to connect with, and build a relationship with, the members of the local urban ag community.

The specialist conducted several field visits, and BCSWCD used these site visits to educate producers on programs, both SWCD and USDA, that were available for them, and to provide technical assistance on conservation practices and management.

Many of the urban producers the district has worked with throughout this grant have had no prior knowledge about the programs or technical assistance available to them, so it was great to be able to reach them and start building relationships.

The urban ag community, and other small-scale producers, share a lot of information by word-of-mouth, so anything a district can do to build relationships and provide assistance will have an impact. Social media is a great way to connect with urban producers share



information as you gain more followers.

As a means to overcome challenges associated with hiring and retaining staff, BCSWCD suggests other districts considering grant opportunities spend a lot of time planning staffing needs.

"Compensation is something that needs to be properly addressed [in grants]," said BCSWCD District Manager Ethan Miller. "Even though we had no idea that things would change so much in a short period of time, we will now make sure we have higher wages in the budget of proposals."

The District is working on securing funding so that the urban ag specialist position can continue into the future.



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



This was the first time a Soil and Water Conservation Delegation to the summit was formed, with the aim to help connect soil and water conservation professionals, conservation districts, state agencies, and partners with their counterparts in the drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater sectors. The Soil and Water Conservation Delegation hosted a peer dialogue session with the lowa Delegation on the first day where it was discussed not only how to bring stakeholders to the table, but also the importance of bringing the table to them.

NACD board member for Connecticut and Coastal RPG member Denise Savageau served as a panelist during a breakout session on "The Critical Role of Soil and Watersheds in Water Resource Management," moderated by SWCS Chief Executive Officer Clare Lindahl. Other panelists included Susan Kozak with the lowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship, and Ethan Brown with the Willamette Partnership. The session emphasized the importance of watershed-wide collaboration, and the important role of natural and working lands in water quality and quantity.

As is summit tradition, delegations presented Commitment to Action statements on the final day. Monte Osterman, NACD board member


CATOOSA COUNTY CD PROMOTES WATER CONSERVATION WITH FRIENDS OF NACD DISTRICT GRANT

In 2021, the Catoosa County Conservation District in Georgia conducted several activities to promote and encourage the importance of water quality and residential water conservation with the help of a Friends of NACD District Grant.

One activity carried out by the district was hosting a Water-Wise Rain Barrel Workshop in partnership with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), the University of Georgia (UGA) Cooperative Extension, and the City of Ringgold. Participants learned



about wise water use, irrigation basics, and the benefits of rainwater diversion and capture. Workshop participants also received instruction on proper rain barrel installation, things to avoid during installation, and examples of uses for their harvested rainwater. Participants were able to assemble their own rain barrels to take home.



The Friends of NACD Grant also supported the districts education efforts by allowing them to purchase an Enviroscape@ Watershed/Nonpoint Source Model and a variety of water test kits to provide students with hands-on experiences as they test the water of local creeks and streams. These training materials will be promoted through the local public school system, home school organizations, and local youth organizations such as 4-H, Girl Scouts, and Boy Scouts. The district also plans to make training available for the use of these resources for teachers, volunteers, and other interested groups.

PLACER RCD DESIGNS IMPROVED ACCESSIBLE RAISED GARDEN BED



Placer Resource Conservation District (RCD) has completed and released design and construction plans for an improved version of an accessible raised garden bed. This garden bed is designed to be longer lasting, improve the reach for those who use chairs, and is capable of recycling water and nutrients!

Garden beds, whether on the ground or slightly raised, are important and symbolic elements of a traditional garden site. Seniors and persons with disabilities, who otherwise find it difficult to garden within a grounded or raised bed, require a special kind of raised bed that better meets their needs. Many accessible raised beds, though helpful, often compromise accessibility for longevity or longevity for accessibility. Thanks to an Urban Agriculture Conservation Grant made available by the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) and the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS), the Placer RCD (and Hamilton County SWCD) took up the challenge of creating a bed that is longer lasting and more accessible for seniors, those who use wheelchairs, or those who generally prefer standing to kneeling.

White House Hosts Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health

President Joe Biden and Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack kicked off the White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health this morning. Today's conference is the first of its kind in more than 50 years. "What was true in 1941 and 1969 at the first White House Conference on Food, Nutrition and Health is still true today. Food and nutrition security are central to our national security and economic future," said Secretary Vilsack. "The first White House conference on food and nutrition more than 50 years ago made significant progress in reducing food insecurity."

The 1969 conference developed a new focus on food-based dietary guidelines and consumer protections, such as nutrition facts labelling. Together, these policies facilitated significant progress in reducing hunger and improving health outcomes across the United States.

The United States and the international community are now facing new food and nutrition challenges. The invasion of Ukraine, COVID-19 pandemic, supply chain disruptions, and severe weather have reduced food production and accessibility. In the United States, half of all adults have diabetes or prediabetes, while three quarters are overweight or have diet-related chronic diseases. In the US and across the world, nutrition insecurity and diet-related chronic diseases disproportionately impact racial and ethnic minorities, low-income families, and rural and other underserved populations.

The five pillars of the conference include improving food access and affordability, integrating nutrition and health, empowering all consumers to make and have access to healthy choices, supporting physical activity for all, and enhancing nutrition and food security research. Conservation districts play a critical role in bolstering food production, increasing agricultural resilience, and increasing access to healthy, nutrient dense food in food deserts in rural and urban communities. Throughout our existence, NACD and 3,000 conservation districts across the country have implemented projects that enhance soil health, bolster production, and improve access to healthy, nutrient-dense foods





Wyoming District Addresses Pine Beetle and Fire Threats

A decade ago, Wyoming was facing a crisis. Wyoming was experiencing a severe mountain pine beetle epidemic that was quickly turning the forests red. The **Crook County Natural Resource District** was tasked by its county commissioners and Wyoming State Senator Driskill to create a team of foresters and sawyers who could make a grid of the forest within the district and treat infested trees. "We hadn't had a forestry program before that." **Sarah Anderson**, Crook County NRD's Program Coordinator, said. "I was the only staff person at the time, and it felt like an overwhelming task."

But with the help of partnerships and grant funding, they contracted with over 80 professionals to assist in treating over 100,000 acres of forested land. "It was a collaborative effort to try and get the state, federal, local agencies, and landowners together and figure out what was working and what wasn't. We definitely worked hard. We listened and learned from other people's mishaps—what worked and what didn't work well." Anderson said. They ended up treating over 71,000 trees to tamp the spread of the pine beetle, but their tireless efforts are why they still enjoy green forests today.

Their most recent hazardous fuels reduction project helped prevent a nearly 7,000-acre wildfire from threatening multiple subdivisions this summer.

YEARS OF CONSERVATION EFFORTS IN NEBRASKA



On September 25- 27, NACD joined the **Nebraska Association of Resources Districts** (NARD) as they celebrated their 50th anniversary at their annual meeting in Kearney, Nebraska.

In 1972, Nebraska's original 154 districts were consolidated along major river basins, to allow for better management practices to be applied to similar topography. Nebraska's Natural Resources Districts were established as local government units involved in a variety of projects and programs to conserve and protect the state's natural resources. Today, Nebraska's unique system of locally controlled, taxfunded, watershed-based conservation is widely admired throughout the nation.

David and Margaret Brewer are the fifth generation of the family to farm with the goal of sustainability and opportunities for the next generation. The Brewers' operation, Emerson Dell Farm, consists of more than 2,000 acres of cropland and 3,000 acres of pasture and rangeland, all on upland soils. The crops they raise include wheat, canola, barley, sunflowers, mustard, and a variety of forage for their cattle. Their cow-calf operation is all grass-fed and grass-finished cattle that they direct market themselves.

David's family were early adopters and considered progressive when it comes to conservation. In a region that receives approximately 12 inches of precipitation annually, Brewer has created a soil health system that helps him capture the moisture he does receive.



Some of the soil health practices they employ include no-till, diverse crop rotation, rotational grazing, and grazing forage blends. Each piece of this system plays a significant role in making this a sustainable operation, but it hasn't necessarily been a smooth transition. Most recently Brewer has been experimenting with inter-seeding and cover crops.


When Brewer returned from a cover crop and soil health trip up to the Dakotas, he looked to put into practice the lessons he'd learned. While the Dakotas are in a completely different precipitation zone and cropping system, he learned the principle of feeding the soil and letting the soil take care of his crops. He believed that if it could work for them, it could work for him – it just might look different.

Registration for the in-person conference includes access to both the in-person conference and virtual component. Registration for the virtual component is available now through March 2023.



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
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CARCD Annual Business Meeting / Call for Resolutions

- Monkeypox (MPX) Exposure at the Workplace On August 15, Cal/OSHA posted guidance on <u>Protecting Workers from MPX</u>. While MPX spreads primarily by close or direct contact, it can also become airborne, so Cal/OSHA defines it as an aerosol transmissible disease. The guidance applies to workplaces covered by the Aerosol Transmissible Diseases (ATD) standard, which includes health care facilities, medical transport, police, public health services and more.



I INTRODUCTION

DTA has been retained to prepare a Plan for Service ("PFS") for the City of Murrieta (the "City") to serve the proposed annexation of the Murrieta Hills project and designated adjacent properties (collectively referred to hereinafter as the "Annexation Area"). The Annexation Area encompasses a 972.7-acre site for the proposed Murrieta Hills project (the "Project"), 192.58 adjacent acres of open space owned by the Western Riverside County Regional Conservation Authority (the "RCA"), and an unmanned 5.74-acre parcel owned by the Eastern Municipal Water District (the "EMWD") on which a water tank is located. The entire Annexation Area is currently located within the unincorporated portion of the County of Riverside (the "County").

A Purpose of the Plan for Service

Pulte Group is in the process of submitting an annexation application (the "Annexation Application") to the County Local Agency Formation Commission ("LAFCO") for the annexation of Annexation Area into the City. LAFCO requires the preparation and certification of a study, called a PFS, when a jurisdiction is to be impacted by a proposed change of organization or reorganization, such as an annexation of additional properties into its jurisdiction. The intent of this PFS is to provide LAFCO with sufficient information to assess the capabilities of the City related to providing municipal services to the Annexation Area once it has been absorbed by the City. In addition, the PFS includes information on the fiscal impacts of such annexation action on the City General Fund, Measure T Fund, Fire Fund, and Library Fund (together, the "City Funds").

B Description of the Annexation Area

The Annexation Area, as depicted in Figure 1 below, encompasses approximately 1,171.02 acres of generally vacant land located within the western portion of the unincorporated area of the County immediately west of Interstate 215, approximately 3 miles east of Interstate 15, and immediately south of Keller Road. The Project site (972.7 acres) comprises approximately 83.1% of the Annexation Area, with the RCA open space (192.58 acres) and the EMWD water tower parcel (5.74 acres) encompassing the remaining 16.4% and 0.5% of the Annexation Area, respectively.

Approximately 63.2% of the Project site (614.98 acres) will be dedicated to the RCA to be preserved in its Multiple Species Habitat Conservation Plan ("MSHCP"). The remaining developable Project site (357.72 acres) is designed as a traditional neighborhood, comprising a mix of housing, recreational amenities, preserved natural open space, landscaped parks, and community commercial uses to serve residents and surrounding communities.



The Project's residential land use component, encompassing 237.52 acres, is anticipated to include single family homes of various sizes. The Project's mixed land use component, encompassing 12.67 acres, is anticipated to be developed into multi-family residential uses (condominiums and/or apartments), with some limited commercial, office or non-residential uses. The Project's commercial land use component, encompassing 18.14 acres, is anticipated to comprise a hotel and a neighborhood convenience center serving the daily needs of residents and employees in the surrounding neighborhoods. A summary of the Project's land uses and their respective associated development unit counts are listed below in Table 1.

C Minimal Service Demand for Non-developable Portion of Annexation Area

As discussed previously in Section I.B, the majority of the Project site will be dedicated to the RCA and preserved as open space. After such dedication, approximately 69% of land within the Annexation Area will be owned by public agencies (the "Public Agency Owned Property") and will include minimal development in terms of a 5.74-acre EMWD parcel containing only a water tank, with no future development anticipated on the Public Agency Owned Property. As a result, municipal services to be provided within those areas will be minimal. Hence, this study will focus on the capabilities of the City to provide municipal services solely to the developable portion of the Project site once it has been absorbed by the City.

D Wildfire Management for the RCA Open Space and MSHCP Areas

With the State of California and Murrieta experiencing an increase in frequency and size of wildfires, including historic brushfires, the City Council has approved an ordinance to increase requirements for brush clearance and wildfire mitigation in the Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones. This ordinance establishes appropriate safety measures necessary to mitigate the occurrence of such fires, as highlighted below:

- Use of metal cutting blades for grass or brush clearance shall be limited to those which are non-ferrous/non-sparking;
- Brush clearance cannot be done on red flag days, when fire weather conditions are at their peak;
- Individuals engaged in brush clearance operations shall not engage in any other activities during their actual clearance of grass or brush;
- An approved fire extinguisher, or a pressurized garden hose with attached nozzle shall be within 10 feet of any grass or brush clearance operation, to quickly extinguish a small fire before it burns out of control; and
- A cell phone capable of dialing 9-1-1 for Murrieta Fire Department shall be charged and readily accessible to the grass or brush clearance operation.

The City is requiring the formation of a community facilities district ("CFD") for the Project prior to the recordation of a final map within the Project site to pay for fire protection services costs incurred by the Project and RCA Open Space and MSHCP Areas. Such CFD must include a component in its special tax capable of funding the full cost of fire services, fire facilities maintenance and periodic replacement of fire facilities at service levels equivalent to current City fire response time. During FY 2020-21, the amount needed to fund such services levels was \$37.58 per acre plus a 12.47% administrative charge, which will escalate annually by an amount equal to the change in the Consumer Price Index for the Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange County, CA, plus one percent.

A written narrative describing the pre-annexation and post-annexation provision of each service listed above follows:

A General Government and Administrative Services

A.1 Before Annexation

The County currently provides general government and administrative services to the Project. These include certain services that the County only provides in the unincorporated County, such as planning and community development services, economic development, arterial, collector and other local road operation and maintenance ("O&M"), local parks O&M and human resources, among other services. In addition, the County provides certain services on a Countywide basis to both cities and the unincorporated County, such as criminal justice services related to jails and courts, which include district attorney, public defender and probation services, as well as health and welfare services and other Countywide functions.

A.2 After Annexation

The City will assume responsibility for all of the administrative and general government services that had been previously provided by the County exclusively for unincorporated County areas. As discussed above, these would include planning and community development services, economic development, local road and street light O&M, etc. within the Project. However, the other services currently provided by the County on a Countywide basis, such as criminal justice services related to jails and courts, which include district attorney, public defender and probation services, and health and welfare services, will continue to be the County's responsibility within the Project.

B Fire Protection and Emergency Response Services

B.1 Before Annexation

Riverside County Fire Department currently provides the fire protection and emergency response services to the Project. The Project is primarily served by Fire Station No. 68, located at 26020 Wickard Road in Menifee. Riverside County EMS Agency provides medical care outside of and prior to receiving treatment by a physician or nurse practitioner in a hospital, clinic, or office.

B.2 After Annexation

The City of Murrieta Fire Department ("MFD") will provide the fire protection and emergency response services to the Project after its annexation. The Project will be primarily served by Fire Station No. 4, located at 28155 Baxter Road, which is approximately 1.5 miles east of the Project. Based on its proximity to an existing fire station, the Project is anticipated to be adequately served by fire protection services.

C Law Enforcement

C.1 Before Annexation

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department provides public safety services to the unincorporated areas.

C.2 After Annexation

The City of Murrieta Police Department ("MPD") will provide law enforcement services to the Project after its annexation. MPD, headquartered at 2 Town Square with no substations, is comprised of 102 sworn police officers, 35 dispatchers, 25 professional staff and 30 volunteers and explorers. The Project is anticipated to be adequately served by police protection services.

D Library

D.1 Before Annexation

Currently, the Project is served by the Riverside County Library system. The nearest County library is the Sun City Library, located at 26982 Cherry Hills in Menifee.

D.2 After Annexation

The Murrieta Public Library, located at 8 Town Square, will serve the Project after its annexation.

E Parks and Recreation

E.1 Before Annexation

The Riverside County Regional Park and Open-Space District ("RCRPD") provides regional park services to all residents and employed persons within the County, including parks located in both incorporated and unincorporated areas. The closest regional park is Box Springs Mountain Reserve in Moreno Valley, which includes several miles of multi-use trails that vary in difficulty. But RCRPD's mandate is only to provide regional park facilities, so it does not support the construction, operations or maintenance of local parks anywhere within its jurisdiction, including within the Project.

E.2 After Annexation

The Project is anticipated to construct approximately 4.6 acres of public parks. The

City's Parks and Recreation Department will operate and maintain those facilities after annexation. This City Department currently supports the operations and maintenance of approximately 1,350 acres of trails, open space, streetscape, slope and parkland, including 53 parks that include one community pool, one skate park, three sports parks, two dog parks, two disc golf courses, and an equestrian park as well as a number of natural areas within the City which are available for use by residents and employed persons located within the Project.

A Homeowners Association ("HOA") will be formed for the purposes of levying and collecting monthly HOA assessments from the Project households to fund the costs of maintaining all other parks and recreation facilities to be consructed within the Project, including the non-RCA open space, pocket parks, and private parks.

F Animal Control

F.1 Before Annexation

The Riverside County Department of Animal Services currently operates four animal shelters within the County, with the closest shelter located in Jurupa Valley, which is relatively distant from the Project.

F.2 After Annexation

Animal Friends of the Valley will provide animal control and shelter services to the Project after its annexation through a franchise agreement with the City.

G Street Lighting

G.1 Before Annexation

The Project presently does not contain any streetlights. Southern California Edison ("SCE") will be responsible for operating and maintaining streetlights within the Project.

G.2 After Annexation

Upon annexation, the City's Public Work/Engineering Department will be responsible for operating and maintaining streetlights in the Project.

H Landscape Maintenance

H.1 Before Annexation

Landscape maintenance services within the right-of-way in unincorporated areas of the County may be provided through applicable special assessment districts, such as Landscaping and Lighting Maintenance District No. 89-1-Consolidated, community service areas, or a community services district.

H.2 After Annexation

Upon annexation, the HOA will be responsible for providing operations and

maintenance services for the landscaping of all right-of-way, parkways and medians within the Project.

I Water

I.1 Before Annexation

Eastern Municipal Water District ("EMWD") provides drinking water service to retail customers within the Project. The majority of EMWD's potable water demand is supplied by imported water from The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California through its Colorado River Aqueduct and its connections to the State Water Project, with approximately 20 percent of water demand supplied by EMWD groundwater wells in the Hemet and San Jacinto area.

In addition, EMWD, one of the largest by-volume water recyclers in the nation and one of the few agencies that achieves 100 percent beneficial reuse, currently receives and treats more than 45 million gallons of wastewater each day at its four operating regional treatment plants. The treated water is then distributed throughout the service area through more than 200 miles of pipeline to agricultural, irrigation, landscaping and industrial customers, including several schools, parks, cities and county streetscaping, HOA landscape areas, golf courses, wetlands habitat areas and industrial use for cooling towers.

I.2 After Annexation

EMWD will continue to be the retail drinking water and recycled water service provider for the Project after its annexation.

J Wastewater

J.1 Before Annexation

EMWD provides wastewater services to the Project. EMWD currently treats approximately 43 million gallons per day of wastewater at its four active regional water reclamation facilities through 1,813 miles of sewer pipelines.

J.2 After Annexation

EMWD will continue to provide wastewater services to the Project after its annexation.

K Transportation

K.1 Before Annexation

Caltrans currently operates and maintains freeways located in the unincorporated County, while, as noted in Section A.1 of this study, arterials, collectors and other local public roads are operated and maintained by the County Public Works Department. Riverside Transit Agency ("RTA") provides public transit in the unincorporated County.

O Solid Waste Management

O.1 Before Annexation

Waste Management of Inland Empire currently provides waste and recycling services to the Project site through a franchise agreement with the County Department of Waste Resources.

0.2 After Annexation

Waste Management of Inland Empire will continue to provide waste and recycling services to the Project site after its annexation, although its franchise agreement will be executed with the City rather than with the County.



K.2 After Annexation

Caltrans and RTA will continue to provide freeway and public transit services to the Project once the annexation has been completed. As noted previously in Section A.2, the City's Public Work/Engineering Department will be responsible for the operations and maintenance of local public roads within the Project. All streets and local roads within the Project will be public.

L Flood Control and Drainage

L.1 Before Annexation

The Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District ("RCFCWCD") provides operations and maintenance services for regional flood control facilities and any local drainage facilities, such as neighborhood detention basins, channels and bioswales.

L.2 After Annexation

The RCFCWCD will continue to manage regional flood control facilities on behalf of the Project. The HOA will take over responsibilities for the Water Quality Management Plan ("WQMP") basins, with the City's Public Work/Engineering Department providing operations and maintenance services for storm drains.

M Utilities

M.1 Before Annexation

The current providers of cable television, internet and telephone services within the area are Spectrum and Frontier Communications. Electricity is supplied by SCE and natural gas by Southern California Gas Company.

M.2 After Annexation

All utility services in the Project will continue to be maintained by the same private parties.

N Schools

N.1 Before Annexation

The local primary elementary school is being operated by the Menifee School District ("MSD"). High School facilities are the responsibility of Perris Union High School District ("PUHSD").

N.2 After Annexation

Both primary and secondary school services will continue to be the responsibility of MSD and PUHSD, respectively.

III FISCAL IMPACT

Fiscal impacts arising from a land development plan can be broadly categorized as one of two types, specifically one-time impacts or recurring impacts.

A One-Time Fiscal Impacts

Mitigation fees ("MFs") are one-time fees utilized to fund a project's fair share of a municipality's infrastructure and capital needs, and are generally paid upon issuance of grading permits or building permits. It is assumed that one-time revenues would directly offset one-time costs. The Project is subject to the following MFs collected by the City:

- Kangaroo Rat Habitat Fee: Collected prior to issuance of a first grading permit and currently assessed at \$500 per gross acre for residential lots less than ½ acre and all other land uses, with residential lots greater than ½ acre being assessed at \$250 per gross acre.
- Murrieta Valley Area Drainage Fee: Collected prior to issuance of a first grading permit and currently assessed at \$1,439 per gross acre.
- Multiples Species Habitat Conservation Plan Fee: Collected prior to issuance of first grading permit and currently assessed at \$16,358 per acre for commercial land uses. Residential land uses are currently assessed between \$670 and \$3,635 per DU depending on the densities of the dwelling units.
- Development Impact Fees: Collected prior to issuance of a first building permit. A single family dwelling unit is currently assessed at \$13,853 per DU, with office and commercial land uses assessed at \$8.987 and \$11.492 per BSF, respectively.

Notably, the Transportation Uniform Mitigation Fee ("TUMF") is excluded from the above list since TUMF will be paid directly to the Western Riverside Council of Governments through the City. The fees listed above focus on City-based fees only. Actual fees will be calculated by the City at the time of issuance of a building permit. Fees may vary due to exemptions, credits or other variables.

B Recurring Fiscal Impact

As detailed in the Fiscal Impact Analysis Report ("FIR") submitted under a separate cover, the Project site is anticipated to generate an annual recurring incremental fiscal surplus at buildout of \$1,384,097 based on the generation of \$2,641,939 in annual recurring revenues and \$1,257,842 in recurring annual costs (See Section IV of the FIR). Overall, the annual revenues generated are projected to equal 2.10 times the associated City Funds costs. If the fiscal impact analysis for a project reflects a revenue/cost Ratio >1, the project is expected to generate a positive net fiscal impact for a municipality's funds.



2022 Special Districts by State




What is driving the growth of districts?


That's what makes districts so effective and so popular!



Much of the recent growth is driven by the second most common district type, multi-function districts, especially in Colorado and Texas.

In Colorado, the number of multi-function districts grew by over 30% in 4 years. A majority of the newly-formed multi-function districts are metropolitan districts created to support increased development in Colorado.

In Texas, the number of multiple utility districts, MUD's, is growing as MUD's are formed to provide miscellaneous utility services not otherwise offered by municipalities like cities or counties.

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The Department of the Interior (Interior) seeks 2-4 million acre feet of cuts from Colorado River water users, and has targeted the Salton Sea region for as much as 500,000 acre feet/year of these cuts. If carried out, such cuts would dwarf the 2003 Quantification Settlement Agreement (QSA) cuts which set the Salton Sea crisis in motion. California has provided roughly \$515 million to address the crisis. While the federal government has estimated the low-end cost of mitigating the *current* deteriorating conditions on federal Salton Sea lands at \$332 million, it has not even provided for these federal land management costs.

"As tribal trustee, Interior has a legal obligation to evaluate and mitigate the impacts of any cuts to Colorado River water use on our tribal lands, especially for disadvantaged Tribes like ours," commented Authority Vice President and Torres Martinez Desert Cahuilla Indians tribal member Altrena Santillanes. "The Tribe recently wrote to Secretary Haaland to highlight that Interior has not complied with these obligations and to ask the Secretary to enter into a formal consultation process with us to evaluate the impact of these proposed federal cuts on our tribal lands prior to taking any action," Santillanes continued.

The Authority has long advocated for assured federal Salton Sea funding to address the existing significant unmet Salton Sea needs associated with the 2003 QSA water transfer. "Together the state and federal costs to address the 2003 QSA transfer of 200,000 acre feet of water out of the Salton Sea basin are likely to be well over \$1 billion," commented Authority Executive Director G. Patrick O'Dowd.

"Interior is now asking our region to make a *substantially* larger conservation commitment to advance the national interest in the Colorado River system and this will require a commensurate and assured federal funding commitment to the Salton Sea and our communities," O'Dowd stated. "Before Interior makes any commitment from this new \$4 billion fund to other Colorado River water users, the impacts on the Salton Sea and our disadvantaged and tribal community of any cuts must be first evaluated and funding set aside from the fund to fully mitigate those impacts, as intended by Congress," O'Dowd concluded.

DEPARTMENT OF REHABILITATION

BACKGROUND

The Department of Rehabilitation (DOR), and the Department of Developmental Services (DDS) received a one-time appropriation of \$20 million dollars to fund strategic initiatives to increase the employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities. The DOR has allocated \$10 million dollars for its Demand Side Employment Initiative (DSEI), an employer incentive program for businesses to expand or begin hiring people with disabilities. DSEI staff will provide helpful resources, technical support, and assistance with implementing equitable recruitment, training, and retention practices. The DSEI funding will be distributed to small and medium-sized businesses through grants beginning in 2022 through 2024.

Salton Sea Authority Applauds Senate Passage of Major Salton Sea Funding

\$4 Billion in Climate Drought Funding
Will Mitigate Salton Sea Impacts of Future Colorado River Cuts

The Salton Sea Authority (Authority) today applauded Senate passage of major legislation to provide \$4 billion to address drought, particularly targeting the Salton Sea. The legislation was included in the Inflation Reduction Act climate bill by Senators Feinstein and Padilla to ensure that the impacts of any federal Colorado River water cuts on the Salton Sea are fully mitigated. The legislation is expected to pass the House of Representatives and be signed into law next week.

"Our disadvantaged and tribal communities have paid with their lives and livelihoods for past state-imposed water cuts to our region," stated Authority President Louis Plancarte. "There is simply no doubt that, without assured federal mitigation funding, the much more sizable federal cuts now under active consideration will decimate public health in our region. I commend our Congressional delegation for their strong leadership in moving this essential legislation forward," Plancarte added.

"With its Justice40 initiative and Executive Order 14008, the Biden administration has made environmental justice the centerpiece of its agenda, committing to invest at least 40% of federal investments like those in this climate drought bill to deliver benefits to communities like ours that have been historically marginalized and overburdened by pollution," noted Alex Cardenas, Authority Director and Board Treasurer. "With this \$4 billion in targeted funding,

the President now has ample resources to back up this at minimum 40% commitment with major action," stated Cardenas.

The Department of the Interior (Interior) seeks 2-4 million acre feet of cuts from Colorado River water users, and has targeted the Salton Sea region for as much as 500,000 acre feet/year of these cuts. If carried out, such cuts would dwarf the 2003 Quantification Settlement Agreement (QSA) cuts which set the Salton Sea crisis in motion. California has provided roughly \$515 million to address the crisis. While the federal government has estimated the low-end cost of mitigating the *current* deteriorating conditions on federal Salton Sea lands at \$332 million, it has not even provided for these federal land management costs.

"As tribal trustee, Interior has a legal obligation to evaluate and mitigate the impacts of any cuts to Colorado River water use on our tribal lands, especially for disadvantaged Tribes like ours," commented Authority Vice President and Torres Martinez Desert Cahuilla Indians tribal member Altrena Santillanes. "The Tribe recently wrote to Secretary Haaland to highlight that Interior has not complied with these obligations and to ask the Secretary to enter into a formal consultation process with us to evaluate the impact of these proposed federal cuts on our tribal lands prior to taking any action," Santillanes continued.

The Authority has long advocated for assured federal Salton Sea funding to address the existing significant unmet Salton Sea needs associated with the 2003 QSA water transfer. "Together the state and federal costs to address the 2003 QSA transfer of 200,000 acre feet of water out of the Salton Sea basin are likely to be well over \$1 billion," commented Authority Executive Director G. Patrick O'Dowd.

"Interior is now asking our region to make a *substantially* larger conservation commitment to advance the national interest in the Colorado River system and this will require a commensurate and assured federal funding commitment to the Salton Sea and our communities," O'Dowd stated. "Before Interior makes any commitment from this new \$4 billion fund to other Colorado River water users, the impacts on the Salton Sea and our disadvantaged and tribal community of any cuts must be first evaluated and funding set aside from the fund to fully mitigate those impacts, as intended by Congress," O'Dowd concluded.

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

District Spotlight: New Transit Tech Risks

A new report from the Mineta Transportation Institute highlights the growing cybersecurity risks that public transit systems are being exposed to as technology becomes more integral to daily operations.

Weekly ransomware attacks on transit systems have increased by 186% since June 2020, according to the report. And as the industry morphs into a more holistic transportation service — integrating with micro-mobility; exploring the use of autonomous vehicles; and upgrading systems to contactless ticketing, onboard Wi-Fi and other improvements — the entry points for outside interference keep expanding.

The report notes that larger public transit organizations are creating chief information security officer positions to help address the risk. It also recommends writing cybersecurity requirements into procurement RFPs and developing enterprise risk management strategies.

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

The pilot project will let employees schedule rides from traditional transit stops to employment hubs in the Solon and Bedford Heights communities, which are 30 to 45 minutes from downtown Cleveland.



The City of Temecula's Military Banner Program honors active-duty military personnel currently residing within Temecula's City limits (or having immediate family in the City). These patriotic banners serve as a prominent reminder of our service members.



Military Banners include the official military photo of the service member as well as their name and specific branch of the United States Armed Forces. Military Banners are installed periodically throughout the year along Main Street in Old Town and in front of City Hall and may be displayed for various lengths of time ranging from a few months up to a year or more, depending on installation and demand. Afterwards, the Military Banners are officially presented to the honoree, applicant, and/or family at the City of Temecula's Annual Patriotic Salute to Veterans held in November.

Out of gratitude for their dedication to our country, the City of Temecula takes every opportunity to publicly honor and recognize members of our military. We encourage

you to honor an active-military duty person in your family - The Temecula Way. There is no charge for these banners which can be ordered anytime, as installation occurs throughout the year.

The honoree is an active duty member of the United States Armed Forces.

- · The applicant must be a current resident of Temecula (priority is given to honorees that currently reside in the City Limits of Temecula).

Wildfire Safety Guidelines

MANMADE AND NATURAL WILDFIRES ARE A SERIOUS THREAT

in Southern California. Temecula citizens can protect themselves and their families by following CAL FIRE's "Ready, Set, Go!" guidelines. For more information go to: readyforwildfire.org/prepare-for-wildfire/ready-set-go.

FEREADY Create and maintain 100 feet of defensible space.
Flammable materials like dry grass and dead vegetation within 30 feet of your home must be removed and replaced with drought-tolerant, fire-resistant plants. The next 70 feet of the defensible space zone should be thinned so that no more than 50% of open space is covered by plants more than 4 inches in height. Harden your home against flying embers by cleaning your rain gutters, roof, and outdoor areas of flammable debris.

GET SET Prepare ahead of time for a quick evacuation.

Create an emergency preparedness plan that includes a meeting place and what to take. The three steps to getting set:

- Create a Wildfire Action Plan that includes evacuation planning for your home, family and pets.
- Assemble an Emergency Supply Kit for each person in your household.
- Fill Out a Family Communication Plan that includes important evacuation and contact information.

BE READY TO GO Give yourself and your loved ones the best chance at surviving a wildfire by evacuating early and taking the precautions necessary to stay safe.

TIPS TO GET YOUR HOME READY

- ° Create and maintain a 100 feet defensible space zone.
- Properly clear and dispose of green waste like vegetation, grass, and other yard clippings.
- Invest in fire-safe landscaping. For more information about creating a fire-safe landscape,
 visit readyforwildfire.org/prepare-for-wildfire/get-ready/fire-smart-landscaping.
- * Use equipment the RIGHT way. Lawn mowers, metal bladed trimmers, chain saws, and other machinery can start a wildfire if not used properly. Avoid rocks that can create sparks and cause a fire in dry grass. Ensure portable, gasoline-powered equipment like tractors and chainsaws are equipped with spark arresters, remain free of carbon build-up, and only have the recommended level of fuel.
- Build or upgrade your roof with metal or tile to strengthen your home's defenses. Roofs have the highest risk of being destroyed during a wildfire.
- Home address numbers should be highly visible, readable from the road, and a minimum of 4 inches in size with contrasting or reflective numbers.
- Protect open outdoor vents (chimney, dryer, etc.) by covering openings with 1/8-inch to 1/4-inch metal mesh or baffles to prevent flying embers from entering your home. Baffles are devices used to restrain air or fluid flow and prevent stray embers. Be aware that fire embers from distant fires can travel airborne over many miles.



Known as Southern California's Wine Country, the City of Temecula has evolved into a nationally and internationally recognized destination attracting visitors from all corners of the globe to enjoy the






Overview of the Temecula Loop

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Dear Fish Passage Community,

You received recent email about an effort underway to clean up Passage Assessment Database (PAD) records across the state focused on non-Caltrans locations. The current focus is on watersheds within <u>CDFW Region 4</u>. This is a **reminder** that there will **vebinar on August 16th** to introduce and explain this effort. Please refer to the details below.

What: In 2021, the California Passage Assessment Database (PAD) and the California Fish Passage Forum (Forum) launched a major effort to review and update records in the PAD - an important tool used by restoration practitioners, decision-makers, funders, and fish passage professionals across the state to improve fish passage in California. The effectiveness of the PAD is dependent on how accurately its data depicts fish passage barriers in California (including information on their location, status, and other attributes), and representatives from the PAD and the Forum's member organizations are working collaboratively to improve this information for the benefit of partners across the state.

This comprehensive effort, also referred to as the "PAD Plan", is being implemented from south to north according to California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) regions and is focused on non-Caltrans locations within priority (core and candidate) watersheds identified in NOAA Recovery Plans. A key component of the PAD Plan in each CDFW region is the verification of barrier records by local experts.

This effort is complementary to Caltrans effort to update and assess all their crossings providing much needed science and data to the PAD. Now it is the rest of the records that need to be reviewed and updated, as needed.

On **Tuesday**, **August 16** the PAD and the Forum will host a webinar for fish passage experts with interest and/or knowledge of fish passage barriers in <u>CDFW Region 4 (Central Region</u>). The webinar will introduce participants to this effort, the PAD, Forum, as well as provide an opportunity to discuss current fish passage issues in the region.



The presenter per poster will receive free conference registration (Accepted abstracts). Poster submissions will be selected based on topic relevance and quality of abstracts.




